In the 6th Ward, G.S. L. City, March 30, 1866, of lung fever, SARAH, wife of Bishop Wm. Hickenlooper, aged 62 years and 10 months.

The deceased was baptized February, 1839, in Armstrong Co., Pennsylvania; removed with her husband and family to Nauvoo in 1841 in time to see the martyred Prophet and Patriarch Joseph and Hyrum Smith; remained in Hancock Co. until the Church started for the Valley; wintered at a place then called Winter Quarters; left there with the company which followed the Pioneers; arrived in this Valley in the fall of 1817; remained faithful to the work of the Lord; bore her last sickness with much patience, and died in full hopes of a glorious ressurrection.

Elder John Taylor delivered a very interesting discourse on the occasion, at the 6th Ward School House, on the 31st, after which the corpse was conveyed to the Cemetery, followed by a large number of persons, who deeply sympathized with the relatives of the deceased. [Com.


