Samuel Newhouse is president of the company and owns 1,500 shares of stock; Clarence McCornick. vice president, 750 shares; Charles H. Griffin, secretary and treasurer, 1,900 shares; Rodney T. Badger, director, 200 shares; David H. Peery, director, 1,000 shares

FEWER BUILDINGS COINC UP.

Less Distributing of Merchandise Owing to Mild Weather-Iron and Steel Prices Steady-

"Labor organizations are accepting reductions in wages without controversy, which removes one threatened industrial factor, and in several branches of business orders are more numer-

Mild weather still checks distribution of merchandise usually in brisk demand at this season, which brisk demand at this season, which check is reflected in restricted activity at woolen and worsted mills and cloth-ing factories. There is not the com-piaint of traffic congestion that was so frequent last year at this time, railway earnings, 6.1 per cent higher than in November to date in 1902, testifying to the increase in facilities. "A week has passed without any fur-ther reduction in prices of iron and steel, and sentiment in the trade favors stability at the bresent position.

year ago.
