

WILL BLOW UP KNIAZ POTEMKINE

Torpedo boats have received orders to destroy her on sight.

NOW REGARDED AS A PIRATE.

Situation is made worse by fact that spirit of insubordination pervades whole Black Sea Navy.

Odessa, July 2, 8:36 p. m.—The fact that the Kniaz Potemkine remains on the high seas in charge of the mutineers is causing so much apprehension and uneasiness to the population of Odessa that the government has resolved to take the matter in hand and to show no further hesitation, even though the measures adopted involve the loss of the battleship and the one torpedo-boat destroyer here.

The torpedo-boat destroyer now here was reinforced this afternoon by two torpedo-boats, and others are expected.

Sixty-seven mutineers from the George Seven had been brought ashore and imprisoned in the citadel. The British consul-general this evening released the five vessels which had been held in readiness to remove British subjects. The consul-general considers that all danger has passed.

The Cranley incident ended. The consul-general, in the presence of the vice-consul, carefully inspected the vessel and found no trace of revolutionists, and the Russian officials apologized to the consul-general.

Peasant disturbances in the neighborhood of Odessa are giving rise to much apprehension. The peasants are forcibly occupying lands and seizing livestock. Troops have been sent to suppress the disorders.

The authorities here are preparing to expel the citizens of the town, and are giving work to 20,000 persons who have been out of employment as the result of the disturbances.

Outwardly the center of the city is beginning to resume its normal aspect, although comparatively few persons are seen in the streets. But in the harbor district all ruin and devastation, shipping and trade are entirely at a standstill and thousands of dock laborers are waiting around.

Officially the forces under strict martial law. Soldiers everywhere cut off all the sea front portion of the city, and there is a scant ceremony in stopping persons not provided with proper permits to enter these districts.

The lamps are not lighted after 9 o'clock at night and persons out later run considerable risk from irresponsible soldiers.

The consulates, banking houses and public offices are guarded by troops day and night. The social life of the city is entirely dead. The beautiful Nicholas church, over which hangs a bell which is usually tolled with well-dressed people listening to the military music, is now completely deserted save for a score of Cossacks and a few officers.

The principal hotels on the boulevard are virtually closed, the visitors having all departed. Only those obtaining special military passes can walk on the boulevard while it commands a view of the center of the town desolated by last week's conflagration.

In the harbor lie the hulls of a dozen large and small ships burnt in some instances to the water's edge. The large warehouses were burned out entirely, and there is scarcely a house or other building in the neighborhood that does not bear the marks of fire. It is impossible to obtain accurate estimates of the damage done, but it is variously estimated at from \$5,000,000 to \$10,000,000.

CREW 18 DESPERATE.

Odessa, July 3, 1:10 p. m.—Interest has been centers in the whereabouts and doings of the Kniaz Potemkine and what course the Russian authorities will pursue toward her. It seems to be incredible that the authorities will permit her to cruise freely in the Black Sea indefinitely. It is reported on good authority that she will be sunk if good opportunity offers.

The situation is complicated by the fact that the spirit of insubordination by the men serving on board the others of the Black sea fleet. It is reported, and the report is credited, that the crews of other warships destined to fire on the Kniaz Potemkine when she steamed out of Odessa last Saturday.

There is much other evidence that there is a spirit of insubordination, to say the least, on board other Black sea ships, stories concerning which took concrete form in a report from Sebas-topol today to the effect that the crew of the Eurus II were paid off and sent ashore to barracks and could be no longer trusted.

The situation of the Kniaz Potemkine is indeed desperate. The crew are practically pirates and their predicament offers only limited avenues for escape.

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
