## TO TELL ABOUT ELECTION.

Telephone and Telegraph Companies Arrange to Handle News.

The telephone and telegraph companies are well prepared to attend to the extra service they will be called upon to give during the exciting times of today's election. The telegraph companies will increase their forces about 25 per cent, and the telephone companies to the clubs, larger hotels and restaurants, and political headquarters, besides making special arrangements to get the returns to the newspapers at the earliest possible moment.

The Bell Telephone company, associated with the other affiliated companies, has special wires engaged and service arranged for between New York, Boston, Chicago, Omaha, St. Louis and Salt Lake. As this company owns its wires from coast to coast, it is entirely independent of the telegraph companies. There is regular through service between Chicago and New York, so that information can be received at the Bell offices in this city, from New York with only relays at Chicago and Denver. The company has arranged to give direct information to the various clubs, political headquarters and newspapers, as well as to organized bodies of subscribers elsewhere. With the 11,000 local subscribers, say nothing of the larger number elsewhere, it would be a physical impossibility to answer all election calls, so it has been found necessary to make special arrangements with various bodies of people wishing to secure the most coveted information. The chief of operators stationed on the ground floor will be on duty from 5 p. m. to 3 a. m.

The Independent Telephone company has leased a special wire to Chicago over which election returns will be wired in directly to a special telegraph operator stationed on the ground floor. This man will send in manifold copies to the long distance and special operators in adjoining towns, where the information will be sent out to subscribers. Forty operators have been equipped with equipment prepared for them for receiving and sending out information locally. The entire force of 80 girls increased to 100 being on duty from 5 p. m. to 3 a. m. The company will provide meals for its employees.

## ALFF PROMISES BELATED REPORT

Councilman Hall Draws Fire With His Resolution of Long Ago.

## MEMBERS ADJOURN IN HASTE

Alderman Black Suggests That Important Business Awaits Members Elsewhere—Pay Rolls Passed.

As foretold in yesterday's "News," the session of the city council last evening lasted just a few minutes over half an hour—37 minutes, to be exact—the half monthly payroll was passed and a recess was taken to allow the members to "whoop 'er up" for election.

Thirteen members were present. They listened to the reading of the minutes in the musical voice of Ben Reeves, deputy city recorder; heard the communication from City Auditor Rudolph Alf, announcing that the report on the condition of the city's finances, for the first nine months of this year, and which was called for a month ago by Councilman Hall, would be ready to submit to the council Thursday night; accepted the recommendation of the engineering department that First North street, between Main and State, be raised eight inches in grade.

Being under the head of unfinished business, Councilman Black then suggested, as he thought the members had some business to attend to on their own account that evening, that the council take a recess until Thursday evening. The motion was promptly seconded and the session was over.
