NIGHT RIDERS' CRIMES EXPOSED

Mrs. Emma Jackson, a Witness, Would Not Leave Courtroom Without Armed Protection.

SHE KNOWS THESE MEN.

Russell, Who Turned State's Evidence, Corroborated Fehringer, and Expects to be Murdered.

Union City, Tenn., Dec. 22.-When Mrs. Emma Jackson, one of the state's witnesses this afternoon in the night riders' trial, was excused from the stand she turned to Judge Jones and

"I will not leave the courtroom without armed protection. I know these

Mrs. Jackson told a vivid story of several visits of the riders, corroborating Fred Fehringer's testimony in many details, as aid other witnesses, and identified by name at least 27 members of the band. She was followed on the stand by her daughter, Miss Dora Jackson, 18 years of age, who corroborated her mother.

The last witness of the day was Will Russell, another alloged night rider, who has turned state's evidence. Russell came to Union City after the Rankin killing and made a confession. He was trembling with fear and could hardly raise his voice above a whisper.

Russell is under constant guard, but believes that he will be killed in spite of these precantions. Russell's story was practically the same as that told by Fehringer and corroborated it in every ossential detail.

Judge Shaw was the first witness. He was the priprietor of a store near Reelfoot lake. The riders forced him to give them oil to pour on the fish docks when they were burned and later whipped him when he tried to go before the grand jury.

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Shaw said the night riders wore mother hubbards and black masks and tried to disguise their voices by talking in, false tones. When Shaw was summoned before the grand jury he tried to slip into town at night. The riders caught him and threatened to kill him. Finally they gave him his choice of a switching or hanging. He told them he was not anxious to endure either, but if he had to make a choice he would prefer the whipping. He got it after the riders whipped him thay it. After the riders whipped him they told him to run.
"Did you run?" inquired the court.

"You ought to have seen me," re-torted the witness. Martin Leonard, another farmer near Relifoot lake, was visited by the riders and given five days to move, under benalty of being hunged. Asked if he moved he casually observed that he was still alive, but his home was

burned.
Witness after witness told of visita-Witness after witness told of visitations by the riders, but there was no identification and no effort made to connect the riders with the murder of Capt. Rankin or his murderers. Mrs. Leonard was asked how many there were in the band which visited her.

"About 200, I reckon: the woods were full of them." she replied.

The purpose of the state is to show the reign of terror in the Reelfoot district inaugurated by the riders and

district inaugurated by the riders and to prove that the murder of Capt. Rankin was only an incident of a gigantle conspiracy.

This afternoon witnesses continued the corroboration of Febringer's confession, detail by detail, raid by raid. Old man Fagan cleared up the mystery of his name. It is Harvey. The day the soldiers arrived Garrett Johnson, one of the eight defendants, drove with him to Camp Nemo. As they passed a little cottage a woman If Hea 255 ever



saw the prisoner, threw up her arms "Now, thank God, I can tell what I know."

She was taken under guard to Union City for her own protection. The woman was Mrs. Emma Jackson, and she was called to the stand this afternoon. The riders came to her home,
forced her to dress and accompany
them to her father's, with her husband
and daughter. They ordered her to
kill some dogs she owned and burn
her father's house. She identified
Garrett Johnson as the leader.
The riders came back two nights later, forced her to go to her father's she was called to the stand this after-

er, forced her to go to her father's half-clad and said there had been some talking done. Tryy whipped her father and then her sisters. She heard her sister's appeal for help and began to scream, whereupon they threatened to whip her. Again she recognized Garrett Johnson and sev-

eral others.

A third time they called to force her A third time they called to force her to get rid of her sister's little child because the latter had quarreled with another neighbor's child. They told Mrs. Jackson that if they had to come again they would whip her. A fourth time they came to whip her father because he testified before the grand jury. On the last visit Garrett Johnson asked Mrs. Jackson if she had talked. She replied:

"No, Mr. Johnson, I have not."

"If you were a man," Johnson retorted, "I'd blow your brains out. We will hang you if you talk."

CASTRO REGIME IN

Dictator Said to Have Conspired To Compass Assassination of Acting President Gomez.

CONSPIRATORS HIS FRIENDS

New Government Gives Evidence of a Desire to Settle All Disputes With Foreign Powers.

Caracas, Monday, Dec. 21, via Wilemstad, Dec. 22,-The end of the rule in Venezuela of Cipriano Castro has come. The dictator, who has governed the republic with a rod of iron ever since he took forcible possession of the Yellow House in Caracas in 1899, is now openly charged with conspiracy to compass the assassination of a man he left at the head of the republic when he sailed away on Nov. 23 for La Guaira, nominally to secure skilled medical aid in Berlin for a malady of long standing, and is today thoroughly discredited. The Bank of Venezuela has cabled its correspondents at Berlin and Paris cancelling the unlimited letter of credit given to President Castro when he left Venezuela' for Europe, and no one in Caracas believes he will ever dare re-turn to the capital. The Castro cabinet has been forced to resign, and a new and progressive ministry has been appointed by Juan Vicente Gomez, the

acting president.

The attempt upon the life of Gomez was frustrated by the coolness and courage and the daring act of the president himself. Alone and unsupported he arrested the ringleaders of the conspiracy with his own hands in the presence of their armed adherents, and after this action he issued a proclamation, saying that not only had he saved his own life but he had maintained the highest ideals of the re-

public.

Already the new administration shows signs of a desire and intention to settle the disputes between Venezuela and foreign powers that have kept the republic in a light of unenviable notoriety for several years has the second of the

At a conference held yesterday be-tween Acting President Gomez and Baron von Seckendorff, the German minister in charge of the interests of Holland since the departure of the Dutch minister, M. De Reus, last sum-type, it was agreed to suspend the mer, it was agreed to suspend the operation of the decree issued by Presi-dent Castro prohibiting the truns-shipdent Castro prohibiting the trans-shipment of goods destined for Venezuela. Pending the signing of the treaty between Holland and a duly empowered Venezuelan commissioner, the Dutch warships that have been patrolling the Venezuelan coast for nearly three weeks will be withdrawn.

The attempt to assissinate Gomez and several of the ministers was decided upon on Friday night, Dec. 18. Gomez heard of the plot and took the personal stand that nipped it in the bud.

THE CONSPIRATORS.

The men concerned in the conspiracy were President Castro's closest friends and best known adherents. Secret cipner cablegrams have passed between President Castro in Berlin and his agents here since the popular anti-Castro demonstration on Dec. 13 and 14. A prominent lawyer has filed and 14. A prominent lawyer has filed an accusation in the high court, charg-ing President Castro with complicity in the plot to assissinate Gomez and pro-

posing the impeachment of Castro.

The minister of the interior, Lineras Alcantera, issued a proclamation d to the governors of the federal districts and federal ter-ritories, which after praising the new government says "now or never Venezgovernment says "now or never venez-ula can and must prove that it pos-sesses, as do all human associations with virile traditions and intrinsic vir-tue, the ability to govern itself well and indefinitely improve. Today by order of the first magistrate all citizens in prison for political causes are liberated. To complete this act of necessary jus-tice all Venezulans at large for the tice all Venezuclans at large for the same causes are called back. We have pending the international conflict which the country knows through the

pending the international conflict which the country knows through the recent government's announcements and this demands imperiously from Venezuelans the obligation of uniting in a common cause. Let us show that we are worthy and strong in defense of the honor of our flag."

The pre-lamation says further that each state will dispose of a share of its income according to the constitution and the government will study every economic condition and give particular attention to the credit. Referring to public contracts, it says that these must be re-established on the basis of constant and reciprocal good faith. "Venezuela knows," says the proclamation, "to what principally is due the poverty of all working classes, and the government will make indispensable rectifications. Venezuela wishes a frank and continuous friendship with all civilized nations. We must therefore try to come to some definite conclusion with regard to questions now at issue, always consulting, however, the diginity of the nation and its inalienable rights."
