the more G d will hear us, the nearer the heavens will draw to us, the more the heavens will be opened to us to hear our cries and to answer our petitions. And, as I have said, the day will come, if we obey the laws that God has given, that Zion will be redeemed and the adversary will not have power over us to tempt us and to try us and to afflict us as he does at the present time. It may be thought F am enthusi-

astic in thus speaking, out I think I am not; I do not think I am the least enthusiastic on this point—that is more than I am warranted in being from that which God has said unto us as a peorle. I do not ex-pect any salvation or rememption for Zion upon any other principle than this i speak of. I do not ex-pect that Satau will be bound in any other way. Of course God will bring his power to bear; He will do
it. God will have the glory of it,
because it cannot be done by man. Man's power is insufficient to ac-couplish it, It must be do by ma 's obedience, by man's submission to Gou's law, by man's coutin-ually doing that which God commands him and requires of him, and in this way alone can it be brought about.

It may be said, as has been said, that the seed of the righteous shall multiply and increase in the land and possess the land. But supposing we do not marry, supposing we re main single, out tak blessing be brought about? In our case, cert in ly not. It requires obedience to law on our part to bring about the fulfiliment of that promise. We must marry as a people. Men must take The daughters of Eve must marry the sons of Adam in order to bring about the fulfillment of that promise. But supposing this peo-ple were to refuse to marry, neither this prophecy nor promise could be fulfilled through them; it would have to be fulfilled through some other people. Obedience is neces sary on the part of the people to bring about the fulfilment of this prediction, and so also respecting the binding of Satan God bestows the gifta and graces of the Gospel according to their obedience, and it should be the aim of every man in this Church not to rest satisfied with his own condition until he has bowed in obedience to the laws of God. If a man had but one wife, and the Spirit of God moved upon him to take more than one, should he refuse to obey the promptings of God in that respect? Not to gratify passion, but to obey the law of God, because if he did not obey that he could not receive the blessing. with all the laws in this book which are yet unfulfilled. If there be a law that we have not fulfilled, should be the aim of every individual in this Church to prepare him-self to fulfil that law as fast as he can. I look upon this as an obliga tion devolving upon every man, woman and child in Zion; not upon the First Presidency alone, not upon the Twelve alone, not upon the Presidents of Stakes alone, mot upon the High Councilors alone, but upon every man and every woman in the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints; going on from the first principles to perfection, carrying out in our lives all the laws that God has revealed to us, until Zion shall be fully redeemed, and the way be prepared for the coming of our Lord and Savior Jeeus Christ.

It is very wonderful to me what God has done and is doing with us as a people. When I lok at this as a people. work; when I contemplate how the Prophet Joseph commenced it and ow it has grown; when I see this mmence congregation assembled ere this morning, I cannot help thinking that if the Prophet had lived to behold such a scene, his neart would have been filled with neart would have been filled with ladness. There has been no ord, no promise given unto us by the servants of God rom the beginning that has not seen thus far fulfilled, and the remainder will be fulfilled. God is carrying forward this work with an rresistible power, and those who will not obey the law of God will be set behind. This is an awful thought to me, there is something awful in the reflection. When I read the history of the Church and see the names of many men who have been prominent in it, I ak ave been prominent in it, I a k nyeelf, where are those men to-day?
Where is their posterity to-day?
Where is their posterity to-day?
If who in their day and generaion were mighly in this work, who
selped to establish it, who helped to
pread it. And they have disap-

faith undoubtedly we will possess, among the Saints of God. Their families have disappeared—gone in to oblivion. When I think of it the thought is almost too awful to contemplate—the idea of being lost in connection with this work, this work in which all our hopes are centered, and which is dearer to us than life. Who is there among us to-day who has the Spirit of God who would not rather be taken out and shot on this public square than lose the spirit of this work, than be separated from the church and lost to all hope, all the promises, and all the glorious prospects of our salvation and redemption? Why, it is the most awful thought I can contemplate. The thought of it fills the soul with horror. But there is only one way in which we can remain connected with this Church, and that is by keeping step with it, by marching onward, obeying the countries of sel that God gives through His servante, and hy being pure in all our thoughts, in all our worde, and in all our actions. In no other way can any human being—however great his attainments, however great the blessings he may have received, however great the promises which have been given unto him-ever remain connected with this work.
Therefore, let us be obedient. Let

us correct our lives if we are in fault. Let ue repent of our sins and put toem far from us. If we have sinned let us humble ourselves before God and in the very depths of humility ask forgiveness of our transgressions, and let us lay ourselves at d all we have, everything that God bas given to us, every faculty of our mind, every power of our body, everything that God has placed within our control, all the property and everything that he has placed in our steward-ship—let us hold all subject to His will and to His counsel, willing to go, willing to come, willing to give, willing to withhold, willing to do everything that God requires of us with giad hearts, for in doing so we secure unto ourselves our salvation and exaltation.

My brethren and sisters, you who have tasted of this pecious word of God; you whose souls have been filled with the Holy Ghost; you who bave selt its joy, its peace, and the glorious feelings that it produces in the human heart—would you forego this for anything else upon the face of the earth? Weuld you exchange it for anything else? No, you would not? You have seen the time—every one of you who have had the when you have felt as though you would rather part with your lives than you would part with that spirit.

Well, now, be entreated of me, a humble servant of God, this morning, to repent of your sine and put them away from you; repent truly and sincerely of your follies, hardness of heart, rebellion, stubbornness—repent, I say, in the name of Jesus, and bow yourselves before Him and entreat Him for the outpourings of His Holy Spirit until your hearts are filled therewith and you have received a forgiveness of your sins. And then when you have done that, go forward, seeking diligently to comply with all the requirements of the Gospel of Jesus Christ, as it has been revealed unto us, until we shall be brought back into the presence of cur Gost and be into the presence of our God and be crowned with glory, immortality and eternal lives, which I ask in be-half of all, in the name of Jesus Christ, Amen.

## THE EFFECTS OF CALUMNY.

Editor Deseret News:

The recent editorial criticisms, on the outrage perpetrated upon the people of Utah, by parties who reside here, yet who never lose an opportunity to defame the dharacter and intentions, of their neighbors; meets with the hearty approval of every wall wisher of our preparate. every well wisher of our prosperous

Territory.

People from Utah, travelling, are often surprised at the character of the queries propounded to them; but should it be a matter of curprise, when we realize the fact that exists in our midet a class who make it a daily practice to vilify and mis-represent the great majority of our citizens? who button hole the visitor, and pour into his ear, a stream of falsehood, the equal of which cannot be found elsewhere? who through a venal press, scatter to the four winds, statements that are sim-ply horrible in the extreme.

It certainly speaks well for the law-abiding proclivities and forbear-ance of the people, that these men go unwhipped of justice, and unpunished for the perpetration of the vi est of crimes. But do we not go vi est of crimes. But do we not go a little too far in the way of forbearance? and is it not too much that we be asked to kies the hand that spurns us, or respect the individual who so maligns us?

These interviews and statements, written and verbal, are the medium through which the world at large very much of their information relative to Utah, and their effects are far-reaching. To illustrate this point, a few years ago a young man in every way worthy and hon-orable, born and reared in our midst, was oruelly murdered while on a mission in the State of Georgia. But is it generally known and understood that known and understood that a series of articles written by a Presbyterian school teacher, then and now a resident of this city, to a Roston educational journal, were Boston educational journal, were among the chief incentives to the perpetration of that terrible deed? That the misstatements contained therein, relative to our condition socially and otherwise, nerved the arm that fired the fatal shot, and formed the basis of argument in the plea of counsel, in extenuation of the murder? Not only is it true of this particular case, but the persons and lives of many of our very test citizens, abroad, engaged in a labor of love, are continually jeopardized, by these infamous statements.

Having had some little experience in visiting portions of the world outside of Utah, I am prepared to assert, from a personal know-ledge, that the principal opposition to be met, and animosity overcome, have their incentives here in our have their incentives here in our own midst, it is fed and kept alive by falsehood, furnished by those who know better, and by those who ask business and social recognition at our hands, men that we meet, and pass the compliments of the day with, continually upon our streets. They may not number many, but what of the great number who stand idly by, and by silence give consent to the wholesale slander of the people? Is there a man of them, who dares to say aught in defense of the traduced character of the fair daughters of our community, than whom, in all this broad land, there are none, nobler, purer or more vir-tuous, in thought or deed? Has there not almost come a time

when forbearance ceases to be a virtue? When these curs that snarl at their betters, should be kicked off the side walk, or shall we have to wait until the refuge of lies is ewept away?
