EASTERN.

NEW YORK.—The latest theory about the murder of Goodrich is that he was murdered either by a woman or by parties instigated by a woman. It appears that the deceased was intimate with two women, one of whom he married. One of these two caused the deed. Two letters are in the hands of the officials, one is addressed to the father of the deceased, and demands reparation for the conduct of his son. The other is addressed to Goodrich himself, upbraiding him for his infidelity.

The officials of the different steamship companies at this port think the bill now pending in the legislature, increasing, by one dollar a head, the money collected from emigrants, is against the interests of the city. The emigrants are already taxed two dollars a head, and the bill referred to will cause additional increase.

A Washington special says that up to the present time only half of the members of Congress have drawn their extra pay. The inconsistency exhibited by many representatives is well illustrated in the case of three New Hampshire members. Hibbard, Bellard and Parker, all Democrats, voted against the increase of the salary, and the extra five thousand dollars, and returned to their homes amidst the election contest involving the question of their own return to the 43rd Congress, making considerable capital for themselves by prolonging their opposition to the bill for the increase of salary. As soon as the election was over Hibbard, who was not returned to Congress, and Parker, who was, immediately wrote and drew their \$5,000 extra pay. Mr. Bell, whose election is still involved doubt, has not applied for his pay as yet. Not one of the members of Congress from Connecticut during the last session has applied for the extra.

NEW YORK.—The inquest in the Goodrich murder case adjourned last night without doing anything. This is part of the programme of the authorities, to keep the facts from the police as much as possible, but from all that can be learned there seems now no doubt that Goodrich was murdered by his discarded mistress. It seems that he, four years ago, seduced a young woman of respectable connections under a promise of marriage. She bore him a child, and the liaison had been continued up to the time of his death. Many persons have seen her entering and leaving the house in Degraw street, and sitting on the stoop beside him in the summer. Goodrich has recently been paying his addresses to a young lady residing in this city, and they were engaged to be married. Naturally he endeavored to rid himself of the other young woman, but he made

the attempt probably without informing her of his faithlessness. She discovered it, however, and charged him with it, and it is supposed that he denied it, and to satisfy her he went through a mock marriage performance, but she became aware of his deceit soon after, and violent quarrels ensued. At length, goaded to madness, she shot him with his own pistol when his back was turned, and twice in the left side of the head as he swung around, once in the right side and once across the forehead. He fell on the hearth-stone. Then, realizing what she had done, she washed the blood off his face, arranged the body carefully to give idea of suicide, took his watch and money for her present necessities and fled. It is certain that Goodrich was killed on Friday morning. A light was seen in the second story about twelve o'clock on the previous night, and the suspected woman was in the house the previous afternoon. That she has fled is also certain, because, although the detectives know who she is, and have been searching for her, she has not been arrested. A mysterious man, who is said to be an important witness, was captured in this city this morning, and is now in custody in Brooklyn. In the closet of a front room up-stairs a new shirt was found, which had been worn but little and never washed. On the collar band bloody finger marks were visible, and about an inch of the end on which the collar button had been sewn was torn off. The other buttons hung merely by a thread. In the drawers of the bureau were indications of the recent occupancy of the room by some female, and some medical apparatus found in the wash stand go to confirm this belief. The inquest was adjourned until Friday, owing to the absence of material witnesses.

CHICAGO.—A Toronto special says the great subject of gossip in Canada continues to be the charge of forgery, for political purposes, preferred by the Toronto *Globe*, against Dodge, the member for North York in the House of Commons. He was formerly member of the firm of Phelps, Dodge & Co., of New York. A suit for libel has been threatened, but the *Globe* continues to reiterate its charges. Great excitement prevails in his constituency. He has just gone over to the ministerial party, and the government press endeavors to shield him.

NEW YORK.—The Supreme Court denies the motion to dismiss the complaint in the case of Boody against Drew, reported yesterday.

WASHINGTON.—The President has sent the following nominations to the Senate to-day:

R. B. Hays, Assistant Treasurer, and John A. Campbell, Governor of Wyoming.

PROVIDENCE, R. I.—A fire, at Phoenixville, R. I., this a.m., burned eight buildings, four of them business places. Loss \$150,000.

NEW ORLEANS.—A fire at Waco, Texas, on Sunday night, destroyed property to the value of \$50,000; insurance 20,000.

SYRACUSE, N. Y.—The Governor has refused to interfere in the case of Frelish, the condemned murderer, who is sentenced to be hanged on Friday next, a stay of proceedings has also been refused by the courts.

WASHINGTON, 25.—H. Burdell, commissioner of Indian affairs, telegraphs from Prescott, Arizona under date of March 11th, that Cochise and one thousand of his band are on the reservation at Sulphur Springs.

The President has appointed E. S. Hammond of N. J., agent for the Indians in the Colorado River agency; J. A. Tanner, of Arizona, superintendent of Indian affairs for Arizona; and George Margetts, of Illinois, agent of the Piutes of south eastern Nevada.

ST. LOUIS.—A driving snow storm has prevailed since early this morning.

NEW YORK, 25.—The postoffice authorities have turned over to Nathaniel Jarvis, junr., the receiver appointed by the Supreme Court, the package of bonds valued at \$17,000, which have been lying in the postoffice addressed to Bidwell, one

of the alleged Bank of England forgers. Other packages of bonds, addressed directly to Duncan, Sherman & Co., are expected, and will be attached as soon as they come into the hands of the firm. George MacDonnell, one of the alleged forgers, was brought before Commissioner Gulman this p.m., and confronted by Sergeant Webb, of the London detective force, who produced the warrant of the Lord Mayor of London for his arrest. The prisoner's counsel raised a point, that there was no proof before the court that the Lord Mayor had jurisdiction in such cases, but it was overruled. Frances Grey, whose expenses were paid here by the British government, testified that she lived in London, and knew the prisoner, who had furnished her money to come to America, promising to meet her in Liverpool; but he did not keep his appointment. She returned to London and was then arrested. She identified Noyes, and was brought here to identify MacDonnell. Detective Farley testified to arresting MacDonnell on the *Thuringia*. An affidavit was submitted that a deposition had been forwarded from London, and an adjournment of the case for two weeks was granted for the preparation of evidence for the Bank, and the accused was remanded to the custody of the U. S. Marshal.

The Goodrich mystery is yet unsolved. It is stated that the building of a row of brown stone fronts on Degraw street, Brooklyn, had involved the supposed murdered man heavily in debt, and that he was not as wealthy as at first supposed. The following is a description of the missing watch: "Gold. Her Prettway, 19 lines, red gold, frosted, No. 11,232. Julius Jurgensen, Copenhagen." It appears that the so-called bloody shirt, found in the house where the murder was committed, had no blood stains whatever on it, and had no buttons torn off, it was simply soiled. The chief of police of Brooklyn still holds to the theory that Goodrich committed suicide, and that the cause was financial embarrassment.

The gas company are firmly determined to refuse any demands for increased wages, and the adoption of the eight hour system, and are confident that if a strike takes place it will result in utter failure. Every precaution has been taken to secure a continuance of work. The final action of the workmen will be taken at a meeting next Monday.

Gen. J. B. Gordon, Senator from Georgia, was temporarily called to the chair this morning by Vice-President Wilson, and presided over the Senate a short time. This is the first time an ex-confederate has filled the Vice President's chair.

SYRACUSE, N. Y.—Henry Fralick, sentenced to be hanged on Friday for the murder of Peter Schafer, was to-day granted a respite by Gov. Dix until April 18.

CHICAGO.—One of the worst snow storms of this terrible season has raged here since morning. A foot of snow has fallen, and it has drifted terribly. Street railway travel has ceased and the trains on the railroads have stopped entirely or been badly delayed. The thermometer is 24 above zero.

NEW YORK, 26.—Among the police authorities the belief is strengthened that Goodrich was murdered by a woman. One woman supposed to be connected with the case proves to be a respectable girl, whose relations to deceased were only those of an employee. There was nothing wrong whatever between them. No clue has been had of the other woman. She had been with Goodrich three or four months before the murder, but now no one seems to be able to account for her, or even give her name. The man in the company of Goodrich on the night of the murder has not been heard of since the night after. It is suspected that this man and the missing woman are together, and that both have gone to Europe.

Antonio Zambra, the distinguished Cuban patriot, has arrived here, and reports that the insurgents have abundance of arms and are in good spirits. They are making steady progress in the eastern department and will very soon com-

pel the Spaniards wholly to withdraw therefrom.

The Rev. Doctors Cuyler and Duryea, of Brooklyn, have gone to Albany on behalf of the recent meeting of citizens in that city, to protest against the sale of lager beer on Sunday.

A special dispatch from London says the Lincoln handicap, the first of the important Spring races in England, was won yesterday by "Westminster" beating "Drumstick" and "Lydon."

At a meeting of the United Order of American Carpenters and Joiners, last night, the general impression prevailed that the employers would not undertake to enforce the ten-hour system. Various trades' organizations will soon have conferences on the strikes, and it may be two weeks before anything definite is known. The masons meet to-night to consider what is to be done in reference to the introduction of men from other States.

CHICAGO, 26.—The great snow storm reported here last night appears to have extended over the entire northwest.

The same special says District Attorney Phelps is making preparations to remove George Francis Train to a lunatic asylum on Ward's Island.

The stockholders of the Bull's Head Bank met this p.m. and resolved to make up the deficiency and resume business. The officers say they have a clue to the guilty parties and will probably have them in custody within a week.

NEW YORK.—Statements are published, based on a report of the controller, that nearly half a million dollars has been exacted in blackmail within the past few years from stall owners in Washington Market. The market overseers in that time were appointees of the fugitive Connolly and among those benefitted by the steal are several well known members of the ring.

NEW YORK.—The counsel of George McDonald, charged with being concerned in the recent forgeries on the Bank of England, have taken action to test the legality of the appointment of commissioner Guttman, before whom the case is under examination, and will probably test the question by means of habeas corpus and certiorari to the U. S. Circuit Court.

In the great suit of the People against Tweed, Connolly, Ingersoll, and others, to recover six millions of dollars taken from New York County by what are known as the audit frauds, Justice Hardin has decided in the demurrers of Ingersoll, that the people of the State have no right of action against Ingersoll. He based the opinion on the broad ground, fatal if sustained, that in the whole suit the county and not the State are the real parties interested, within the meaning of the code.

There is considerable stir at the Post Office over the expected withdrawal by the railroad companies of the postal cars from the service on the first of April. It is thought that the force of clerks will be utterly unable to attend to the great flood of mail matter which that event will pour in, and it is estimated that four days will be required for the delivery of letters which now reach their destination in fifteen hours. The demand of the railroad companies is for \$800 per mile, instead of \$375 as now paid them. It is rumored that if the companies persist in this determination the Post-Master General will endeavor to procure the passage of a law giving the department special powers over railroads.

The children of Wm. Foster are prevented from attending school by taunts and insults of other children. Writs of habeas corpus and certiorari were issued by Judge Fauche to bring George Francis Train before him on Thursday, for inquiry into the cause of his detention in the Tombs.

The President of the Typographical Union, No. 6, of this city, reports that the subscription to the Greeley monument fund is coming in rapidly from the printers throughout the country, and there is every prospect of success.

PORTLAND, Me., 27.—The Marr heirs met yesterday and formed

an association, called the Marr Claim Association, to prosecute their claims to the estate of Marr in Scotland, worth sixty million dollars.

CHICAGO, 27.—A New York special says a special meeting of the United Order of Masons was held last night in Demilt Hall, to take action on the proposed strike. All trades were represented. The proceedings were very violent and disorderly. Speeches were made by prominent internationalists, denouncing Commodore Vanderbilt. One man wanted him hanged to a lamp-post. Another said, if there is any interference with the eight-hour rules the streets will run with the blood of the capitalists. A committee was appointed to wait upon the mayor and the Common Council, and demand the enforcement of the eight-hour law. Reporters were excluded. At midnight the meeting was still in session, with the prospect of continuing until morning.

It is rumored early this morning that Dolan, who is suspected of murdering Goodrich, has been arrested, but the police have declined to give any information.

It is remarked that of the numerous murders in Brooklyn, reaching to nearly eighty within a few years, no clues ascertained in any of them have been of a satisfactory character.

At a private meeting of gas men here last night, the eight hour question was discussed. A strike will probably take place soon, if the employers do not consent to that system. The gas men act independently of other organizations.

A Washington special says in reference to the President's action in the case of O'Brien that all facts about the murder of Cunningham show that it was not premeditated, that there were circumstances about it which the President could consider, but which the jury could not. A case of murder with malice aforethought, such as have disgraced Washington and New York for the past year, will find no mercy with the President, but Washington has hung three and convicted four, while New York has hung but one and convicted but two.

ALBANY, N. Y., 27.—Wm. M. Tweed sent to the Senate to-day his resignation as Senator.

HARRISBURG, 27.—The State bill appropriating a million for the Centennial exhibition was concurred in by the House, with much enthusiasm. It goes to the Governor, whose signature is already assured.

NEW YORK, 27.—George Francis Train was in the Supreme Court to-day, on habeas corpus, and counsel moved for his discharge, on the ground that when Train was originally indicted for circulating obscene literature he pleaded guilty, but nevertheless was never sentenced. It was shown to the court, however, that the indictment was endorsed not guilty, hence the case was turned over to the criminal court, where it will come up to-morrow. Train made a few remarks referring to his incarceration, and the attempt to have him declared a lunatic.

BOSTON.—The Japanese minister Mori sailed for Liverpool yesterday.

CANADA.

OTTAWA, Ont.—In the Dominion Parliament to-day, the government was defeated on a question which arose on a decision of the Speaker in regard to an election petition against an opposition member. The government supported the Speaker, but on a division of the House it was beaten by a majority of four.

WEST INDIES.

HAVANA, 24.—Bidwell, alias Warren, who was arrested here charged with being a principal in the Bank of England frauds, has secured the service of a Havana lawyer to defend him. It is probable that Bidwell will remain here some time.

DOMINION OF CANADA.

TORONTO, 26.—A severe snow-storm prevails all over the province to-day. In some localities it has fallen two feet deep.
