LOCAL BRIEFS.

Water Applied For-B. C. Ward and R. N. Johnson of New York City have fied application with the stale en-gineer for 150 acre feet of water from the San Rafael river in Emery coun-ty, to irrigate 480 acres of land in that vicinity. The project involves a reservoir seven miles long on the river, A. Colbath of this city filed applica-tion for 15 second feet, from Granito creek to irrigate 6,000 acres of land.

Inspection of sheep in this state begins this week, and the 500,000 sheep in the Uintah forest reserve ought to be completed in 20 days. There are 2,000,000 sheep in this state.

Assistant County Attorney Hanson Has Been Working up Evidence For Three Weeks.

After working on the case for three weeks gathering evidence, a complaint was issued Saturday afternoon by Assistant County Attorney Willard Hanson against Justice of the Peace C. F. Durand of Murray, James A. Luke and Francis G. Luke of the Merchants' Protective association, and Thomas Kane, the attorney who has been doing the court work for the collecting agency in Durand's court, charging them with criminal conspiracy. The com-plaint was sworn to by Deputy Sheriff Robert Bridge and was filed in Judge J. J. Whitaker's division of the city court. Durand, Kane and James A. Luke were arrested by Deputy Sheriff Sharp and taken before Judge Whita-ker, but were released upon their own recognizance. Francis G. Luke, the manager of the collection agency, is now enroute to Alaska, and is expected back in about two weeks, when he will be accested

be arrested. SEIZED THE DOCKETS.

Assistant County Attorney Hanson went to Murray Saturday afternoou and seized the dockets of Durand's court and will hold them for evidence in the trial. While there and while talking to Durand on the outside of his courtroom Mr. Hanson stated that a man called at the court in answer to a summons on supplementary proceed-ings, and was directed by Durand to step inside where Attorney Kane was and the latter would attend to his case, It is said that Mr. Kane questioned the man and entered up judgment against him without Durand being in the courtroom at all

SEVEN CASES CITED.

Seven cases are cited in the complaint wherein it is alleged that the defendants herein conspired together to cheat and defraud the defendants in the cases mentioned. The first is that of A. Mayer against W. F. Olson, in which it is alleged that on Jan. 26, 1906, the Lukes and Kane filed a complaint in Durand's court and that Durand assumed jurisdiction of said case when he knew that he did not have jurisdiction, and that he issued a false and fraudulent writ of attachment when he well knew that the proper and lawful undertaking on attachment had not been filed in the case. It is also claim-ed that he pretended to dismiss the case when in fact he did not dismiss it but entered judgment against de-fendant and issued an execution upon which the Lukes and Kane attempted to collect the amount of the judg-

FRAUD AND CONSPIRACY.

The Thirteenth Quorum of Seventy The other cases cited in which fraud and conspiracy are charged against the defendants are: B. F. Reich against A. B. Pitts; Ella E. Hennesy against John Walsh; Lyon & Richardson the elders' quorums of the against William Hobbs; C. H. Herritage against Al Zuckswert; W. F. Fer-rebee against Joseph Alleop; O. G. Snow against L. H. Moshler. In the case of Reich against Pitts it is alleged that Durand issued an attachment without the affidavit or bond being filed as required by law. It is also claimed that he assumed jurisdic-tion in the case well knowing that he had no such jurisdiction. In all the other cases which were filed by the Lukes and Kane it is charged that Durand assumed jurisdiction runlawfully and in several of them issued fraudulent writs of attachment. In one case he assumed jurisdiction and entered judgment when he knew that the defendant in the case had never been served with a summons at all. THE ALLEGATIONS.

UNIVERSITY OF UTAH

Briefly the allegations of conspiracy

are as follows: That Francis G. Luke, James A. Luke, Charles F. Durand and Thomas Kane committed the crime of conspiracy on the twenty-sixth day of January, 1906, in that they unlawfully and maliciously conspired together falsely move and maintain certain suits. actions and proceedings, to commit acts for the perversion and obstruction of justice and the due administration of the laws and to falsely cheat

is alleged that they represented to defendants in actions brought by the Lukes that proper affidavits and undertakings had been made and filed in the court, when, as a matter of fact, which the Lukes and the court well knew, they had not been made and filed and that further, the defendants caused writs of attachment and writs of garnishment to be issued on these pretended affidavits and undertakings.
