## BIG REPUBLICAN VICTORY.

Returns from City and County—Heavy Gains Made by Socialist Party.

Law and Motion Calendar Before District Court—Funeral of Mrs. Sleeth—Wedding.

The victory which was scored by the Republican party in this county, in making a clear sweep, is about the only topic of discussion that appears to be interesting the public in general these days. The results were even beyond the most sanguine expectations of the Republicans themselves, but they are exceedingly jubilant over the same, while the Democrats are feeling very sore in this county, they are already predicting victory two years hence.

The Socialists feel that they have scored at least many points in polling as many votes as they did for their candidates, and the results are, it is true, very encouraging for them as two years ago they cast only four votes for congressman, while at the election Tuesday their candidate, Matthew Wilson received over 200 votes.
