The world cannot do without the church of Christ, or without the living faith that is with the church. The speaker closed by testifying in a very earnest manner that the church of Christ has been restored in this genera-tion, and with it all the gifts and pow-

ers of the Holy Ghost. President Angus M. Cannon de-livered a few brief remarks, in which he related the prediction made to Judge Stephen A. Douglas by the Prophet Joseph Smith, to the effect that Dougwould aspire to be President of the United States, but if he ever raised his hand or voice against the Latter-day Saints he should fall. The speaker told how Douglas raised fils voice against the Latter-day Saints, and how he was defeated in his campaign for the Presidency when his prospects were indeed good.
