CLEVELAND AND THE ISLAND BILL.

Washington, D. C., March 22.—Counsel for Canada's Bremenberg have decided to follow the example of their opponents, by reserving their client's testimony for the closing argument in their case.

Accordingly, the silver-haired Congressman disengaged many people gathered to go on the witness stand, and one of the disappointed ones was Miss Folsom herself, who left the courtroom as soon as she learned the protest. DOVER CONFEDERATION.
