WALLABURG.—Bro. Richard C. Camp writes that on the 25th inst. the inhabitants of that place had a full amount of festivity, in honor of the entrance of the Pioneers into the Valley of the Great Salt Lake, and that the day passed pleasantly and peaceably away. They are now engaged in erecting a co-operative saw mill, which promises to be a source of wealth and convenience to them.

Bro. Camp says there will be two crops of wheat raised there, the rest having been taken by the locusts; but potatoes, corn, sugar cane, peas, squash and other things of a like nature promise well. Grass is somewhat stunted and dry. The people have erected this season from seven to eight miles of "good lawful fence," and though they have been so severely handled by the locusts a spirit of contentment prevails.

ACCIDENTS.—At Millville, Cache county, two serious accidents occurred last Monday. One to a young man, who had the back part of his skull seriously fractured by the bursting of his gun, which he had loaded heavily and, contrary to the advice of friends, persisted in firing. There were some hopes that his injuries would not prove fatal. The other accident befell a boy—while leading a horse through a gateway, the gate fell upon and broke his leg. The name of neither of the unfortunate is given, and the particulars, so far as we are able to give them, are from a letter written by Bro. Joseph Humphreys.

"DEATH TO SMALL POX."—Under this heading, we have received the following communication, which may be worth considerable to the public if its suggestions are followed:

"After being exposed, eat a sufficient quantity of onions to move the bowels, and go on about your business. Try it and report the effect to this office, so that it may be published to the world with more signatures than one. I speak from experience. Be careful not to have onions that have been exposed where the disease exists. O. F. EASTMAN."

MEETING OF LANDOWNERS.—The meeting of landowner's of the 7th Ward Pasture was held, according to appointment, last evening at the 14th Ward Schoolhouse. Hon. S. W. Richards was elected to the chair, and Bro. Elias Morris secretary. A report of the committee was read and adopted. The committee, of which Bro. Wm. Thorne, of the 7th ward is chairman, was instructed to hire a herdsman to take charge of the pasture, and the stock turned in there. The pasture is to be used for the turning in of stock on Monday, August 1st. It was resolved that all land owners are to get tickets from Bro. Thorne for the number of head to which they are entitled, which tickets will be signed by him to show the herdsman and gatekeeper that the bearers have the right of pasturage there. Until this is done they cannot turn stock in the pasture. The cattle which will be taken charge of by the herdsman should have a board fastened to the neck of each with the committee's brand on, so as to be easily recognized. These boards will be branded by Wm. Thorne. The formation of a herd, in charge of a competent herdsman, which will be driven there every morning and be brought up every evening, will be an excellent opportunity for those who own land there to send their cows on to good pasturage, as the feed is said to be very fine. Of course they will have to pay the wages of the herdsman. We may say that it was decided that owners of pasturage should have grazing for three head for every five acres, and two head for every five acres of hay land.

A WILD MAN.—The latest sensation in the Rocky Mountain region is a wild man. The White Pine News says that the people of the northwestern part of Nevada are in a state of excitement over the supposed discovery of a wild white man in the densely wooded mountains near the Utah line. A search was made, and at moonlight a man, about forty years of age, was seen nearly covered with white hair. He carried in his hand a club, and in the other a rabbit. He instantly caught sight of the party, and with a tremendous roar, he attacked the horses with his club. The dogs of the party, although well trained, could not follow him. Throughout the night the party was aroused by his terrible cries. He so injured one of the horses that he had to be killed. The party followed on his track until they came to a cave, where they found a set of soldiers' buttons and a dime dated 1841, from which they came to the conclusion that he was a man lost from Fremont's command in 1846, or near that time.

## FOREIGN NEWS.

FRANCE.

American feeling in France misrepresented.—Prince Napoleon suspected.

PARIS.—It is reported that General Sheridan, who is coming from America, will be refused leave to accompany the army.

The American feeling here has been misrepresented. No French journal dares republish the Daily News telegram, describing that the general sympathy of the Americans is with Prussia.

It is reported that Prince Napoleon was obliged to accompany the Emperor as a precaution against his possible disloyalty, in case of defeat. An independent command has been denied him. General Lebeuf positively refused to give him the command of a division.

General Dornmayer, who is in command of Paris during the Emperor's absence, has full power to declare martial law if needed.
