#### WILL NAME REFEREE.

Because of the acts above cited, Crosier asks that Bean be forever dis-barred from practising law in this state. When the supreme court resumes its session on Dec. 1, it will probably appoint a referee to hear the testi-mony in the disbarment proceedings and report the same to the court. Bean has lived in Richfield all his life

and is a brother of O. U. Bean of "Corianton" fame, and also of Willard Bean, the athlete, of this city.
