Paul Pierce Shoots His Father, Gustave Pierce Who Threatened Family.

Idaho Falls, Ida., Aug. 13 .- The arrest of Mrs. Augustine Pierce and her son Edward near this city last night, made public the perpetration of the murder of Gustave Pierce, the husband and father, a few weeks ago at Mud Lake, in Fremont county. The younger son, Paul, previously arrested, is reported to have made a full con-fession to the murder of his father, saying that his mother and brother, however, helped him bury the corpse, after a coffin had been made of boards taken from a bary.
