

from the south-eastern counties, as they were supposed to be Mormons, their religion not suiting him. He did not say, however, of what religion delegates ought to be, and the convention, not thinking a declaration of faith necessary on the part of members, emphatically quashed the Colonel's pious efforts. The Colonel is evidently laboring under a hallucination. He seriously appears to think that Mormons are about to capture the United States, his mines in Alturas included, which result is supposed to be the effect of reading the absurd and ridiculous stories published in the Salt Lake Tribune.

"What effect did Colonel Wall's anti-Mormon talk have upon the convention?"

It created a little impatience, as the members, not having come to a religious meeting, desired to proceed to a consideration of the political interests of their constituents.

"How does the nomination of Hon. John Hailey suit the people?"

Exceedingly well, and I believe very generally. Mr. Hailey is highly esteemed as an honest man, and will have the support of many Republicans as well as of the entire Democratic party. He is an able and industrious man, who will faithfully represent and labor for the interests of the whole people of Idaho.

"Do you think he will be elected?"

There is no doubt of it. The Democratic party in Idaho are free from any serious internal difference, and are determined to have the Territory represented in Congress by a reliable man of the people, and as Mr. Hailey's character and former labors as Delegate are widely known and appreciated, he will no doubt be our next Delegate.

"What are your views on the political outlook?"

Not having made politics a study, my views in a general way may not be very valuable to your readers. Judging from such sources of information as I possess, it appears certain that the mass of the people desire relief from Republican misrule, and hail with measure the prospect of general reform.

"With what favor is Singiser looked upon at Boise?"

Disfavor; he is looked upon as a stranger who has no interest in the Territory, his chief care being to look after himself and his friends. His seeming popularity arises from a desire on the part of Republicans generally to raise an anti-Mormon issue in the Territory, and they find Singiser a true representative of that idea, not that Mormonism concerns many very much, but the cry against it may, it is hoped, prejudice some Democrats to support their ticket. That war cry is, however, worn out. There is no excitement in it and, I think, few votes. —Bear Lake Democrat.

WHY NOT TELL IT ALL?

The local *Christian (?) Advocate* seems very anxious to advertise the "Mormons"—adversely of course. Why did not the *Christian Advocate* collate and send forth all these facts? Are they too much in favor of the "Mormons?" Again, there are some 5 notorious houses of ill fame in this city, presided over and occupied solely by anti—"Mormon" women and girls. Will the *Advocate* note and publish these statistics? Are they not all here the interest of anti—"Mormon" civilization, refinement, reformation, etc.? Everybody knows that till the anti—"Mormons" reached here there were no such adjuncts of modern civilization in Utah. The *Advocate* will please make a note of this data and the similar data heretofore published, and the next time it attempts to write down the "Mormons" please expose all the facts bearing on the subject, and don't suppress the most pertinent ones. The mines in Bullion are still improving, although many blackmailers have come and gone and made their report to the contrary. The mines of Marysvale have suffered more discredit from proposed capitalists than any other class of visitors claiming expert knowledge of mineralogy, and to the credit of the hard handed miners be it said, not one of the real workers or prospectors have faltered in the least. A steady holding on by the miners has been the plan and object of us all until the happy time comes in which men of money and honest truthful brains shall make their appearance in the camp. Then the public mind will become undeceived and old bullion will drive ahead in real business style.

The letter to the public, as shown in the prospectus of the Holderman party, relative to the Deer Trail and other mines, is an open confession, stating that they had cried down the mines to miners until they had got all they wanted, and would now deal liberally with those patronizing them in the purchase of their stock. Their confession was too flagrant, and they stand minus *vox populi*, just as they deserve. This is only one case out of the many.

The Morning Star and North Star mines are developing well in the hands of R. Warnock & Co.; the body of ore in the North Star is now three feet vein, running in assay from 236 ounces to \$2,000 per ton; they now have 150 feet of stoping in the mine, of good ore. The Morning Star is on the same vein, and the ores on these two mines furnish a shipping grade. The portion of the Wasatch range called Mt. Baldy range, here in the south, has good mines. Some tellurium gold has been found here on the Webster Butte that runs up into the thousands. Fine Horn Silver ores come rolling down the mountain sides at every freshet, and the way is open for prospectors, that is, good ones, no sloths nor drunks are desired. They will rank in influence equal to many capitalists and business men that we have been pestered with as a mining camp.

The health of the people is good. Harvest is now about over and the weather dogs are indicating an early winter.

Mr. Warnock & Co's reduction works have started up, and show success. It is evident they will ship ore from this camp. Ore sacked running 1,000 ounces will not be left long in the hills by Mr. Warnock. We anticipate a looking up in mining operations here, in the near future, and those trying to put us down will be remembered when the good time comes. 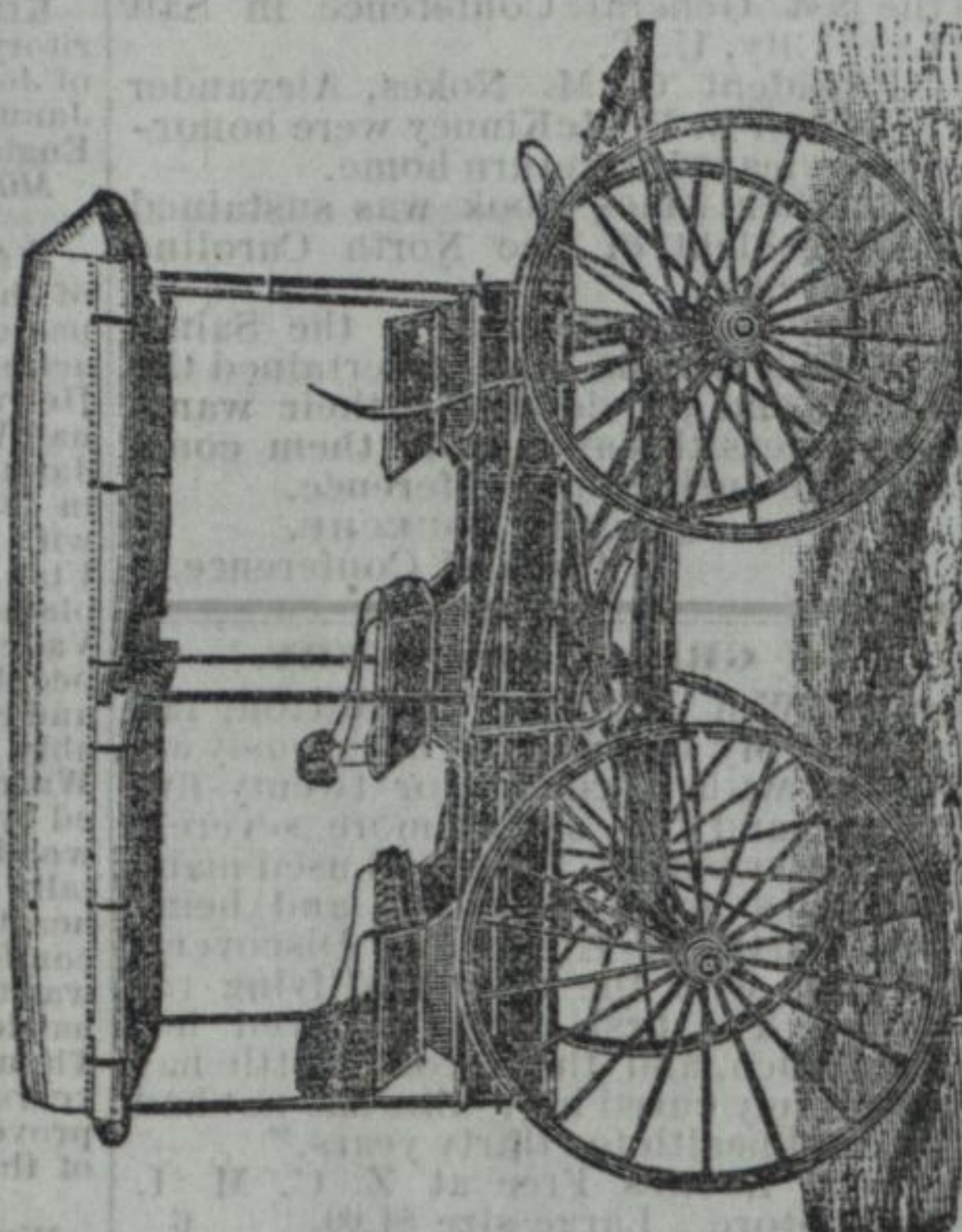

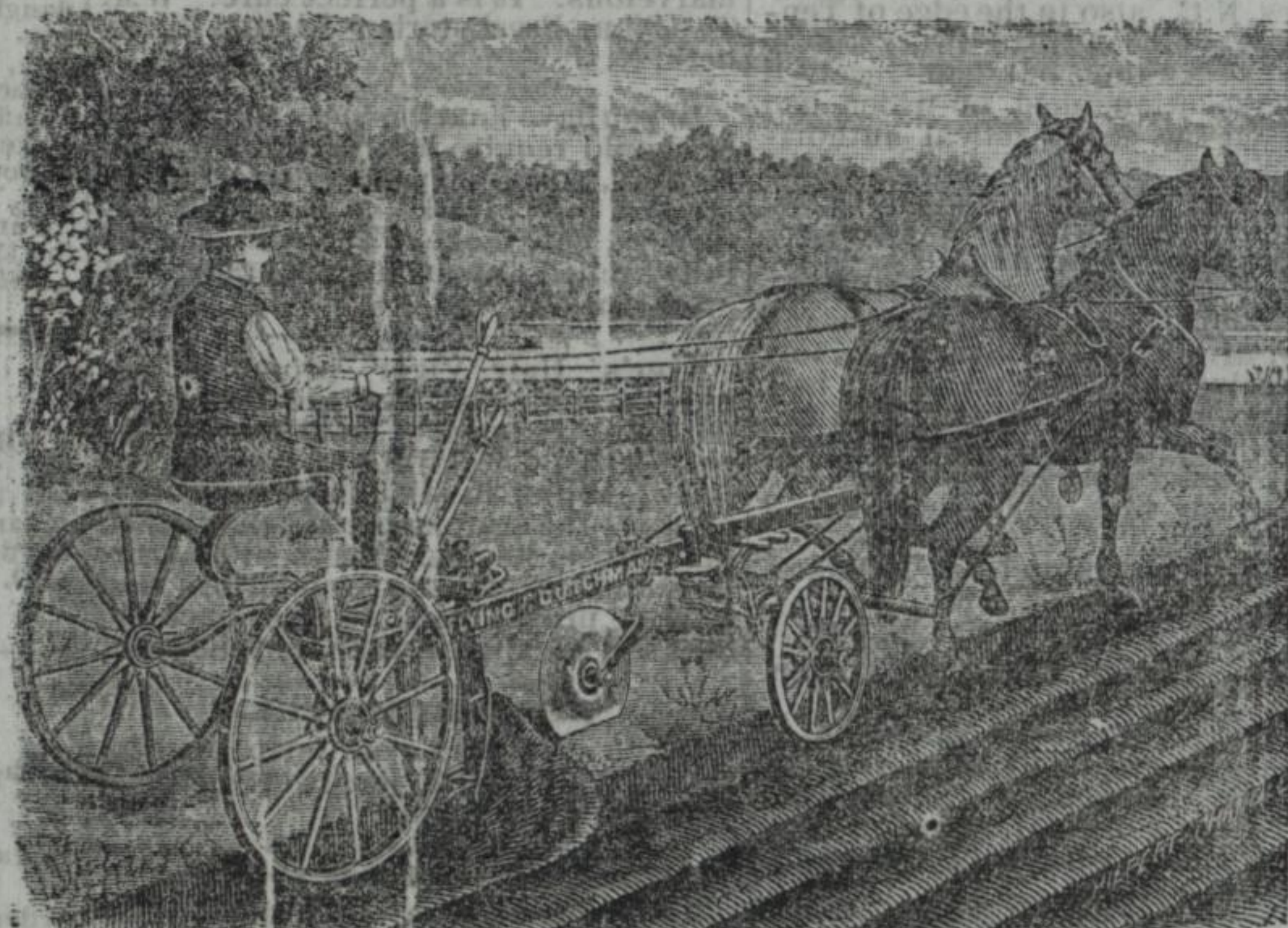
