

BY TELEGRAPH.

LONDON, 29.—The grand jury at Croydon found a bill for misdemeanor against Col. Valentine Baker of the 102 Huzzars, who is charged by a young lady with assaulting her in a carriage on the South-western Railway.

Six hundred and fifty persons attended the banquet of the Lord Mayor at the Guildhall to-night. No member of the government was present except Lord Tenterden, under secretary of the foreign department. The prefect of the Seine and the French ambassador sat respectively on the right and left of the Lord Mayor. The Lord Mayor, in proposing a toast to the municipalities of Europe and America, announced that he had received a telegram from the mayor of Philadelphia, sending his greeting, regretting his absence, and inviting all to attend the centennial exhibition next year at Philadelphia. Letters of regret were read from the mayors of towns in Germany, Denmark and other countries. The prefect of the Seine, the mayor of Quebec and the syndicate of Rome responded to the toasts. The French representatives were much applauded. All present expressed their gratification at the cordiality of the reception and the brilliancy of the entertainment. In addition to municipal guests there were present the foreign ministers resident in London, the members of Parliament for the city and for the home counties, and others.

PARIS, 29.—In the Assembly, today, M. Raoul Duval asked the government why the U. S. had not paid to French citizens the indemnity due them for losses sustained during the civil war, while the claims of other foreigners had been settled. The Duke De Cazes, in reply, said the indemnity due to other foreigners was likewise unpaid. President Grant, in his last message to Congress, recommended that it take legislative action on this matter; Congress, however, had not moved yet. In conclusion the Duke said he had full confidence in the good faith of the American government.

Twenty-two hundred workmen employed on the St. Gothard tunnel struck to-day, and gathered at the northern entrance of the tunnel and blocked it; the Swiss government sent a body of troops to the spot, who dispersed the rioters, killing two and wounding seven.

LONDON, 30.—The grand ball by the Lord Mayor of London to the mayors and other civic dignitaries from abroad, took place to-night at Guildhall; it was a magnificent affair. Nearly 3,500 persons were present, including all the distinguished guests at the banquet yesterday. No member of the British ministry attended.

STUTTGART, 31.—The Emperor William has telegraphed from Gastien that he will contribute a prize of honor to be competed for in the German national rifle match here next week.

ST. PETERSBURG, 31.—A fire broke out on Thursday in the town of Breansk, government of Oerl, and raged until to-day, when it was extinguished by rain, and two-thirds of the place was destroyed. The inhabitants became panic-stricken during the conflagration, and fled to the fields for safety. Breansk comprised a population of 13,000.

CONSTANTINOPLE, 31.—The *Levant Herald* states that the government has authorized the circulation of the Bible in Turkey.

LONDON, 1.—An immense meeting in favor of an amnesty for the Fenian convicts was held in Hyde Park to-day; it was estimated that 100,000 persons were present. John O'Connor Power, member of Parliament, presided, and in his speech declared that the Fenian prisoners were entitled to approbation rather than censure. Biggar, member for Cavan county, and Messrs. Harnell and Mellon, were also present. Resolutions of the usual character were carried by acclamation.

The Rev. Mr. Richards, of Charleston, West Virginia, whose death at Edinburgh was reported yesterday, died from the effects of a fall in a railway depot, by which he fractured his skull.

The *Times* in its obituary article on Andrew Johnson, says his career illustrates both the strong and weak points of the American social and political systems. During his term of office he showed himself wanting in tact and refinement

and knowledge of men, yet he had some qualities which are not so abundant in American politics as to be despised when found. He had dauntless courage, political insight, and honesty never shadowed by suspicion.

The *Times* says that the government system of sending shilling dispatches over the telegraph lines of the country has disappointed expectations, and the time is coming when this rate will cease to pay, and unless a great change is made, the service will become a heavy and increasing permanent charge on the country's finances.

CROYDON, 2.—Col. Valentine Baker was arraigned to-day to answer an indictment charging him with misdemeanor for an assault upon a young lady in a railway carriage.

SLAUGHTER OF THE MALES AND THE INNOCENTS.—The mortality in the city of Cleveland (O.) for the week ending July 24 was 120, of which 72 were males and 48 females; 74 were under one year old, and 18 from one to two years; 47 died of cholera infantum, and 8 of convulsions. So says the *Plain Dealer*.
