LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

THE BLONDES.—Either the election or the excessive heat told heavily on the house last evening—it being only about one-half filled. This is as it should be, and is enough to prove to sensible persons that though a few here may be influenced by greenbacks and whiskey, the great majority of the people of Utah are worthy of the suffrage, and knowing their friends, in spite of the misrepresentations so industriously circulated by political enemies, jockeys and "dead beats," they will elect them to office. The result of yesterday's election must be highly gratifying to every lover of good government and order residing in the Territory of Utah.

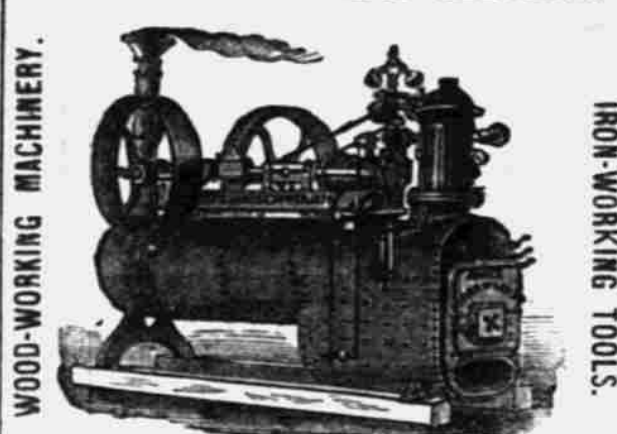
