## MYSTERY ABOUT ASSAULT CASE

Both Page and Farse Accuse the Other of Being the Aggressor—Woman in the Case.

## REV. CUSHNAHAN RECEPTION.

Fitting Climax to Jubilee Festivities—Virginia Hotel Scene of Brilliant Affair.

Ogden, June 26.—The further the officers investigate the assault made on Ora F. Page Sunday afternoon in Ogden canyon, the deeper grows the mystery of the altercation which occurred between him and Lawrence Farse. Deputy Sheriff Clarke was sent up the canyon with Page to look over the grounds where the assault took place, but was unable to find any particular evidence against either party. About the only thing he found of a tangible nature was the cap belonging to Farse, which he lost in the fracas. The assault was made on the mountain side, where it is very steep, but at the spot where Page claims the blow was dealt, shows no signs of the men having had a scuffle.

An unusual circumstance connected with the case was brought to light yesterday. The police say, that on Sunday afternoon a woman who gave her name as Mrs. Sine Farse and her address as 151 South West Temple street, Salt Lake City, called at the police station and told the officers that she had come to hunt up a young man named Page, who had been keeping company with her daughter. She claimed to have sent him money at various times and that he promised Sunday afternoon to meet her at the depot in this city, having written her that he was out of money and she sent him \$2. As he did not meet her, she wanted the police to look him up, and notify her at the address given; she left his photograph also. The question now troubling the police is, did Farse have cause to be jealous of his wife, and what was the landing Page for on Sunday afternoon? Page denies the story told by the woman of having received money from her or of his having promised to meet her at the depot.

It is very evident that Farse did not let anyone know he was coming to Ogden Sunday, as after his arrest he had Sheriff Sebring telephone to a neighbor to care for his horse, admitting that he had not even told his family he was coming to Ogden. The case is an unusual one and some more developments are expected by the police, who expect to sift the case to the bottom, as it is evident the secret of the occurrence has not yet been told and may be sensational when it comes to light.

## REXBURG, IDAHO.

EDWARDS-FLANN NUPTIALS.

Body of Joe Smith Found in Canal—Foul Play Suspected.

Rexburg, Fremont Co., Ida., June 21.—George Flann has just returned from Logan, where, last week, he and Miss Anna Edwards of that place were married in the Logan temple.  
The body of the man found in the Egin canal a few days ago has been identified as that of Joe Smith of this place. The verdict of the coroner is that Smith was killed and then thrown into the canal. The officers will make an effort to ascertain who committed the crime.  
Sheep shearing in the vicinity of Rexburg is in full blast, and large ricks of wool are being piled at the depots for shipment.  
Rexburg has three daily trains in each direction. The Yellowstone Limited goes north at 6:22 a. m., returning at 9:47 p. m.; the local passenger is scheduled for 8:15 for the north and 7:35 for the south; the mixed freight and passenger, when on time, leaves going north at 3:30 p. m., and south at 8 a. m.

## SESSION OF CITY COUNCIL

Councilman Poulton Mayor Pro Tem—Councilman Snow Resigns.

## FOURTH OF JULY PROGRAM.

Interesting Statistics of the David Cluff Pioneer Family, now Numbering Nearly 800 Souls.

## Social Correspondence.

Prove, June 26.—Councilman Poulton was appointed mayor pro tem by the city council at its session last evening, to act during the absence of Mayor Frisby in California.

C. A. Glazier appeared before the council in behalf of the Smoot Investment company and presented the matter of the city and the investment company joining in making the company's tailrace an outlet for the city sewer, and covering the tailrace to a level with the street, on the west side of Academy avenue south of Sixth South street. Referred to a joint committee, consisting of the committee on streets and alleys, and the committee on sewer. Before the reference Councilman Miller stated that in his opinion the expense would be greater than the city can now afford.

A telegram was read from Senator Smoot to Mayor Frisby, in answer to communication sent the senator, asking that a small forest reserve, covering the Bridal Veil falls and their watershed, be created. The telegram reads: "Cannot create permanent reserve of single section in which falls are located. If permissible it would make no difference with Mr. Nunn's rights. Department compelled to respect them. Can create reserve of all Provo canyon, and the lands between Spanish Fork and Salt Lake reserve, but private holdings are large and many objections will not save the falls. Joseph R. Henry and C. H. Bradley, to collect \$100,000 alleged to be due on a promissory note."

Action was deferred for one month. On motion of Councilman Partridge the matter of investigating the rights acquired by Mr. Nunn to the Bridal Veil falls, and what steps, if any, can be taken to save the falls, was referred to the committee on judiciary.

Councilman Snow, of the Fifth ward, tendered his resignation, having removed to Salt Lake. Mr. Snow expressed pleasure in his association with the council and wishes for its success and the prosperity of the city. No action was taken on the resignation.

City Attorney Thomas asked if the members of the council would accept service in the case of A. E. Acord vs. the members of the city council and City Marshal Henry for judgment. The members refused to accept service. City Marshal Henry had already expressed his willingness to do so.

A motion to sell a wide-tired sprinker, and replace it with a narrow-tired sprinker, was lost.

An ordinance providing a license of \$3 a year for operating a soda water fountain not in a drug store, was passed. Councilmen Giles and Gott voting against it.
