EUROPEAN DISPATCHES.

Coming to Utah—Spain and the Slave-trade—Bishop of Exeter—More Diamonds—Tichborne Case; 300 Witnesses.

LONDON, 23.—E. B. Williams, liberal member of Parliament, has passed off with a conservative member, in order to make a brief visit to the United States. He will visit the mines in Utah, and expects to be absent two months.

A deputation from the anti-slave trade society, waited on Earl Granville, and made a representation in regard to Spain's non-observance of the treaty for the suppression of the slave trade. Lord Granville, in reply, said it was his duty to make a representation to the United States, but the matter was too delicate for the interference of England at the present time, Spain having an insurrection on her hands.

The British minister at Madrid was doing his utmost to secure the observance of all treaty obligations. His lordship said he would consider with his colleagues before taking any steps, or pronouncing his opinion as to the conduct of Spain.

While the bishop of Exeter was presiding, at a meeting to-day, in favor of the passage, by Parliament, of a bill permitting the sale of liquors, a certain radical, named Bright, was insulted and attacked by a number of men. Some friends of the bishop interfered for his protection, when insults were renewed and the meeting became uproarious. The police were called in and cleared the hall of the disturbers, several of whom were injured by the clubs of the police.

The election excitement in Kerry reigns dangerously high. It is reported that the Fenians are organizing mobs to support Blennerhassett, the home rule candidate, and that the priests are threatened with violence. Bright has written a letter to the O'Donoghue, denouncing the home rule.

Advices from Cape of Good Hope represent that rich discoveries continue to be made in the diamond fields. Among others, two diamonds had been found of one thousand carats each.

The Tichborne case continues to attract much attention. The defendant, who is charged with the murder of his wife, has been found guilty of high treason. The defense say they have three hundred witnesses. Revelations of an exciting character are looked for.

MADRID, 23.—Senator Herrera, minister of the interior, has been elected president of the national cortes, was defeated to-day. The election of Herrera was made a cabinet question, and his defeat will probably lead to ministerial changes.
