

## EARTHQUAKE AND LOCAL BUSINESS.

Belief That Misfortune Favorably Affects the Conditions Here.

### HEAVY RUSH IN DRY GOODS.

Real Estate Is Quiet But Dealers Expect to Benefit by the Pacific Coast Disaster.

The business situation for the week has been depressed in a number of directions by the San Francisco disaster. However, the local banking situation has not been visibly affected, and the Salt Lake market is fairly easy. In fact one banker says he believes that the Salt Lake market will be favorably influenced by conditions on the coast. There was a heavy demand for funds on the coast from the west early in the month, but that has ceased about April 10 on the same day the long desired and hoped for announcement was made of a substantial gold import movement. This was quickly felt in the markets.

Deposits are increasing faster this spring than last year at this time, and there is a steady and good demand for money for investment in all kinds of improvements.

Generally speaking, Salt Lake and Utah money markets are in a healthy condition.

The dry goods men report a very good trade, except in the line of kid gloves. The demand for the gauntlet glove is so fierce that the factories cannot fill orders, and buyers have to leave their orders and get the goods when they can. The parasol trade is hardly beginning, but by another week will be fairly well started. The dry goods men claim that business for the week is ahead of what it was a year ago for the same period. The millinery business has quieted down after Easter but is sure to pick up later.

### IN CLOTHING LINE.

The clothing trade is satisfied with the week's business and the prospects, as the spring trade has started in well, and the complications on the coast have not affected this market. However, there will be a heavy demand for a short time on the great eastern clothing houses for supplies for San Francisco, owing to the complete destruction of stocks of goods there. And when this feature is considered, there will be a pressing demand for all kinds of groceries, clothing and everything else of the staple articles used in life.

The demand for hats in the Salt Lake market has been unusually good this week, and soon the straw hat trade will open. Business in minor lines has been very fair, considering the excited condition of the public mind for the time.

### REALTY OUTLOOK BRIGHT.

The local real estate men report a quiet week, on account of conditions on the Pacific coast. But look to see the situation brighten at an early day, as some of them argue that many residents and many investors living elsewhere will cease to interest themselves in San Francisco on account of the uncertain outlook for topography stability. The entire California coast is slowly rising, so that more earthquakes in the not very distant future are anticipated. In view of this, it is held here that San Francisco will build up very slowly, and Salt Lake will have a good deal of the real estate investment money from elsewhere that otherwise would have gone to San Francisco.

### BOOTS AND SHOES.

There has been no change in the boot and shoe markets this week, but dealers call attention to the fact that prices ought now to be stiffer than ever on account of the situation in San Francisco. It seems that the good people of that city have been noted as very heavy buyers of shoe leather, so much so as to attract the attention of the trade. The fire has cleaned out the immense stock held in the San Francisco stores, and to keep the 500,000 people decently shod will put all the manufacturing establishments of the country on their mettle. It will be rush, rush, rush for weeks to fill the country from the west coast. This will not help prices any in this city, and citizens might as well become reconciled to the possibility of even higher figures in this state.

### HARDWARE BRIGHTER.

The hardware men are feeling better, as the fair, open weather continues, and the feeling appears to obtain pretty generally over the country as the demand for steel and iron products and copper is still unprecedented. It is expected that the Amalgamated Copper company will declare an extra dividend in this state.

at an early date. The steel corporations are working with full force, especially orders from the railroads for steel rails are being booked in large quantities. The trade reports rapidly increasing demands for builders hardware, garden hose and tools, clothes baskets, washing machines, wringers, harnesses, woven wire fencing, in short about everything of the 1001 things in the hardware line. Dealers report that contractors tell them there is to be an unusual amount of building in Salt Lake during this spring.

The agricultural implement trade reports business picking up very acceptably, with many coming into town to buy, and with the great amount of moisture in the earth and in the mountains, the season is bound to be a prosperous one.

### BUSINESS NOTES.

The week has been somewhat quiet in local stocks and only a few deals are recorded by brokers. The favorites in the list seem to be Consolidated Wagon preferred, Home Fire of Utah and Z. C. M. L. all of which are closely held. Sugars generally were weak, and Idaho fell to \$8.00 on the news of the passing of the dividend. Brokers say, however, that there is but little stock offered at these figures, and that this sale was a forced transaction; the reports which come from the beet fields of extensive planting are expected to cause a rallying in the near future.

## IDAHO SUGAR CO'S ANNUAL MEETING

General Manager Cutler Makes Extended Report on Blight.

### OVER MILLION SPENT IN IDAHO

Board of Directors Orders Passing of Dividend and Suit Will be Planned For Bounty Due From State.

The annual meeting of the stockholders of the Idaho Sugar company was held in the Deseret News Annex at 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon. Out of the total capital of \$50,000 shares, 218,519 shares were represented in person or by proxy.

General Manager T. R. Cutler made an extended written and verbal report showing the difficulties through which the company had passed during the year, on account of the blight which had visited Idaho as well as Utah. The blight, added to the shortage of water, had been severe around Blackfoot, and that factory had been run at a considerable loss. It had been less acute around the other two factories, but it had been felt sufficiently to reduce the saccharine contents of all beets received, and the loss of so much sugar had been a serious item to the company.

The report showed that the two factories at Idaho Falls and Sugar City had paid the farmers for 131,151 tons of beets the sum of \$ 656,100.46 Labor and material in working up the beets, 308,961.56 Maintenance, repairs, etc., 52,610.45 Taxes, 23,976.71

Total, \$1,041,649.18

This sum, which was expended in the state of Idaho, does not include the general expenses of the company, interest on money borrowed, etc., and is also exclusive of beets paid for, labor, material, etc., at the Blackfoot factory. It was also stated that in view of the unsatisfactory showing for the year the board had ordered dividends discontinued for the present. Another reason for this was the fact that the sum earned from the state of Idaho as bounty had never been paid, and it was probable that a lawsuit would have to be entered upon before the result could be known. The board was reluctant to take this step, but it had no other recourse. The sugar had been manufactured in conformity with the provisions of the law, and the claim against the state now amounted to about \$125,000; only a part of this, however, had been carried in the assets of the company.

General Manager Cutler stated that the outlook for the coming season was much more promising. Already about 20,000 acres of beets had been contracted for around the three factories and the acreage was steadily on the increase. The election of the board of directors resulted in the choice of the following to serve for the ensuing year, the only change being in the substitution of the name of George Romney for that of Soren Hansen. Mr. Hansen, living out of town and being rarely able to give attention to the company's interests: Joseph E. Smith, John R. Winder, Thomas R. Cutler, W. S. McCorkle, John Henry Smith, Heber T. Grant, John C. Cutler, George C. Parkinson, George Romney.

### NORTH MONTANA ROUND-UP.

Issue Manifesto Scoring Trusts, Capitalists and Wall Street.

Helena, Mont., April 21.—The North Montana Round-up association, composed of cattlemen in northern Montana and representing \$10,000,000 in individual holdings, at its annual session today, issued a manifesto in which the trusts, capitalists of industry and Wall Street are severely criticized. After referring to the blight on the cattle industry due, it is alleged, to the beef trust, the statement is made that if conditions are not better this season than they have been for three years, many owners will have to go into bankruptcy.
