

HOUSE OF LORDS BREEDING TROUBLE

Determination to Reject the Budget Means Conflict With The Commons.

CHOSEN WAY OF DESTRUCTION

Secures Daily Chronicle—Calls it Shameful Conspiracy Against The Commonwealth.

London, Nov. 16.—The terms of the Landowner's motion to reject the budget, of which he gave formal notice in the house of lords today, were communicated to premier Asquith and the cabinet council, and the premier anticipates that 200 peers will support Lord Lansdowne, while the rest of the government in the house of lords number only 80. On the rejection of the budget it is expected that the premier will move in the house of commons a resolution condemning the peers' action, affirming the sole right of the commons to deal with matters of taxation and declaring the peers' attempt to force a dissolution unconstitutional.

What further course premier Asquith will take is not known, but it is quite likely that the cabinet will resign upon the government is defeated at the elections.

Mr. Balfour, leader of the opposition in the house of commons, will deliver a speech at Manchester tomorrow night, which probably will contain the government's election manifesto. The United States Church already is in a liberal manifesto.

REGULATION OF MONOPOLES

Ex-Secy. of the Interior Garfield And Dr. Charles W. Eliot Make Pleas for Federal Control.

AN IMPERATIVE NECESSITY.

That Government Take Immediate Steps for the Conservation of Natural Resources.

Cincinnati, O., Nov. 16.—Pleas for the government regulation of monopolies were voiced tonight before the joint convention of the National Municipal league and the American Civic association by former Secy. of the Interior James R. Garfield, and by Charles W. Eliot, president emeritus of Harvard. Both declared that it was imperative that the government take immediate steps for the conservation of resources.

Mr. Garfield said that the country's natural resources are in imminent danger of exhaustion, and that interests which developed this source of national wealth must be regulated.

Mr. Garfield also maintained that the interests of the people were not being properly safeguarded in the Alaska coal fields and that legislation on that subject was urgently needed.

GARFIELD'S ADDRESS.

He said in part:

"The permanent welfare of our nation cannot be assured unless we, in this generation, provide for the conservation of our natural resources. Hitherto we have been needlessly wasteful. We have been too much occupied with the present; too little with the future. The inventory of our resources shows the immediate danger of their depletion or exhaustion.

"Conservation is pre-eminently a movement for the public welfare. Exclusive as the railroads are regulated because they are public utilities, so must interests that develop natural resources be regulated, because they deal with public interests. Unfair use or monopolization of either is intolerable.

"In Alaska the coal area of a million acres has been withheld from entry, pending investigation. Laws providing for the disposition of the coal lands are not what they should be.

"Some improvements have been made in recent years, but the rights of the public are not safeguarded. None of these lands should be disposed of until legislation is enacted which will provide a method by which the coal can be developed as it is needed until such regulations as will prevent speculative or monopolistic holdings by a few great interests, and will yield to the nation a fair monetary return. Under a leasing system all these conditions can be readily improved.

"Congress has wisely provided for the great irrigation projects that have been started, but there is immediate need of legislation to control the use and development of waterpower to the end that, as with other resources, the public may, under a system of franchise or lease, protect its own great interests and obtain just compensation.

"The great progress that has been made through the recent years, will not be stopped. The people of our country will not tolerate any backward steps. They demand, and will see to it that their demand is heeded; that the great policy of conservation shall be one in the interest of public welfare."

DR. ELIOT.

Dr. Eliot was equally emphatic. "The sentiment of preserving our natural resources," he said, "has gone like wild-fire throughout the country. The people have reached positive convictions, and they mean to have conservation."

At the afternoon session, A. L. Well of Pittsburgh, who has prosecuted municipal corruption in that city, said that the greatest deterring elements in reform are public apathy and lack of financial support.

STORY OF HOW MAYBRAY GANG SWINDLED

Council Bluffs, Iowa, Nov. 16.—The first story of a Maybray victim on the witness stand was told today in the district court when T. W. Ballou of Princeton, Mo., told how he was swindled out of \$30,000 on Oct. 14, 1908, in this city on a fake horse race. Ballou was the first witness called for the state in the trial of John Robbins, who is alleged to have led Ballou into the Maybray game.
