

ITINERARY FOR SENATOR FAIRBANKS

OUTRAGE BY GEORGE.

Fire Into House of a Ga. Farmer, But Kill no One.

Savannah, Ga., Sept. 19.—The house of J. J. Bennett, a prominent farmer, two and one-half miles from Screven, was fired into by a mob of negroes late last night and one of his nephews received a bullet in the crown of his head. Sheriff Overstreet, with two bloodhounds, spent the night in the vicinity of the Bennett home in an effort to catch the marauders, but failed. The home of Bennett is a two-story building, and the mob, who were armed with guns and knives, entered the house and set fire to it. The fire spread rapidly and the house was soon in flames. The mob then fled, and the fire was extinguished. The house was a total loss.

Gen. Russell Hastings Dead.

Peterham, Mass., Sept. 18.—Gen. Russell Hastings of Bermuda is dead, aged 69 years. When the Civil war broke out he enlisted in the Twenty-third Ohio, in which Rutherford B. Hayes and William McKinley also enlisted. Gen. Hastings became adjutant-general on the staff of Gen. Hayes and later was made colonel and brigadier-general by brevet.

HORACE MAPLE LYNCHING CASE.

Grand Jury Finds that the Sheriff, Mayor and Chief-of-Police Are Responsible.

RECOMMENDS IMPEACHMENT.

Action of Governor Cunningham in Sending Militia to Huntsville Is Commended.

Huntsville, Ala., Sept. 19.—The special grand jury which investigated the Horace Maple lynching made its report tonight, recommending the impeachment of Sheriff Augustus Rodgers, Mayor Thomas W. Smith and Chief of Police David B. Overton, and recommending that the police force of the city of Huntsville be reorganized. The grand jury finds that Sheriff Rodgers was guilty of neglect of duty, of incompetence in that he did not prevent the lynching and failed to take proper precautions for the defense of the prisoners.

Heavy Storm in Iowa.

Des Moines, Ia., Sept. 20.—A terrific wind, hail and rain storm has damaged many thousands dollars' worth of property at Oskaloosa. The building occupied by Spencer's wholesale grocery firm was demolished, the Illinois Central depot was unroofed, and practically all the business houses were damaged more or less severely. Reports from other parts of the state indicate the severity of the storm. At Albia the hail was said to be five inches deep.

WESTERN SUPPLY CO.

Judge Kohlsaat Places It in the Hands of a Receiver.

Chicago, Sept. 19.—The Western Supply company, 18 West Randolph street, one of the largest farm implement firms in the middle west, was today placed in the hands of a receiver by Judge Kohlsaat, in the United States court. This action followed the filing of a petition alleging insolvency by creditors of the concern. Ralph R. Bradley, who was appointed receiver, under bonds of \$100,000, has taken possession of the assets of the company.

KING PETER OF SERBIA.

Everything is Ready for His Coronation Next Wednesday.

Belgrade, Sept. 19.—The city, which is lavishly decorated, is filled with visitors, but there is no great enthusiasm over the approaching coronation of King Peter, which will occur Wednesday. The weather is cold and rainy, and threatens to spoil the festivities, while the meager harvest tends to give the people the inclination to complain of the waste of money spent on the coronation, although the amount is not large.

ARMY POST SCHOOLS.

Gen. Bates Says no Great Advantage Comes from Them.

Washington, Sept. 19.—Major Gen. J. C. Bates, U. S. A., commanding the northern division, in his annual report to the war department, says that the experience of many years is that no great public advantage is derived from the post schools for enlisted men, and that they should be conducted as night schools with permission for any soldier to attend who so desires.

A DARING HOLD-UP.

Robbers Invade a Section House And Kill Two Men.

Chicago, Sept. 19.—Two men were killed and another shot and seriously injured in a battle with hold-up men at Riverside, a small town on the Illinois Central railroad, 15 miles south of Chicago, tonight.

TEN PRISONERS ESCAPE.

Walked Out of Trinidad Jail Through Treachery of Trusty.

Trinidad, Colo., Sept. 19.—Ten prisoners walked out of the county jail at an early hour this morning through the treachery of Ray Hathaway, a trusty, serving time for a minor offense. Hathaway unlocked the cells and gave the prisoners their liberty. Hathaway and one other prisoner were recaptured, but the others are still at large.

LOOKING FOR FILIBUSTERS.

Secret Service Men Looking for Them in New York.

New York, Sept. 20.—Secret service employees are reported to have been watching for several days in the rooms of the custom house in the harbor among ships clearing for Honduras and nearby ports for a filibustering expedition which is suspected of fitting out here. The department of state has been in communication with Salvador Cordova, the consul general of Honduras here, over the matter.

SHIPBUILDING TRUST.

Plans for its Rehabilitation Being Consummated.

New York, Sept. 20.—Plans are being rapidly consummated, says the Herald, for the rehabilitation of the Ship Building combination. Within a month the last foreclosure sale of the several plants will have been completed. Bath Iron Works and the Hyde plant, in Maine, having been purchased by the re-organization committee of the United States Ship Building company, Charles M. Schwab will start tomorrow for San Francisco with the receiver, former Senator James Smith, junior, to attend the sale of the Union Iron Works.

WAGGOMAN RESIGNS.

Was in Response to Cardinal Gibbons' Request.

Washington, Sept. 18.—Thomas E. Waggoman has resigned his position as treasurer and a member of the board of trustees of the Catholic university. The resignation was tendered in response to a request contained in a letter to Mr. Waggoman signed by Cardinal Gibbons, the chancellor of the institution. It became effective Sept. 1. It is thought that no action will be taken toward filling the vacancy until the next meeting of the board of trustees. Meantime, the business affairs of the university will be supervised by Waggoman's attorneys, this course being regarded as necessary because of Mr. Waggoman's connection with the university.

FOREST FIRES.

Those in Montana Are Doing Great Damage.

Anaconda, Mont., Sept. 19.—The forest fires west of the city have progressed so far that there is now danger that the buildings at Mountain View park may be destroyed. The advance of the flames is being watched closely by a force of men employed by the railroad company. Should the danger be great a general alarm would be sounded and a bucket brigade organized. There is plenty of water at the park if it could be properly directed. Up in the mountains along Warm Springs canyon fully a dozen prospectors' cabins have been burned. In some instances the cabins contained giant powder, which exploded.

"Billy" Matthews Drowned.

Bad Axe, Mich., Sept. 20.—Hudson Matthews, well known to the hunters of Michigan as "Billy" Matthews, was drowned in Saginaw bay while out with a boat near his bungalow, situated between Behnke and Bay Port.

Matthews' home was formerly in Montreal. He spent 13 years in the employ of the bank of Montreal. He was a ranchman near Winnipeg in the early '80s, and later the first auditor of Pembina county, North Dakota. His fortunes were at low ebb for several years till a legacy made him comparatively well off.

He had lived here for several years, coming first on account of the hunting. He was one of the best wing shots in Canada, and was well known among Detroit bird hunters. His body has not yet been found.

Diamond Polishers May Strike.

New York, Sept. 20.—Diamond merchants here report that another strike is probable among the cutters and polishers of Antwerp and Amsterdam over the apprentice question. The men only recently returned to their work after a long strike.

Steam Launch Blows Up.

San Francisco, Sept. 20.—The steam launch of the United States cruiser Macland blew up today while lying alongside the ship. Two of the five men on board were rendered unconscious for a time, but came around all right in the ship's hospital. The launch, which was quite old, was saved before it sank.

Lost in the Adirondacks.

Cranberry Lake, N. Y., Sept. 20.—Exhausted after two days wanderings in the swamps and dense forest of the Adirondacks, George Wilson, 16 years old, of Chicago, has been found by guides and hotel guests.
