# Are Responsible. RECOMMENDS IMPEACHMENT.

Action of Governor Cunningham in Sending Militia to Huntsville

Is Commended. hrge.

Huntsville, Ala., Sept. 19.-The special grand jury which investigated the Horace Maple lynching made its report tonight, recommending the impeachment of Sheriff Augustus Rodgers, Mayor Thomas W. Smith and Chief of Polles David B. Overton and recommending that the police force of the city of Huntsville be reorganized. The grand Jury finds that Sheriff Rodgers was guilty of neglect of duty, of incompetency in that he did not prevent the lynching and failed to take proper pre-cautions for the defense of the prison-

The jury finds that Mayor Smith was guilty of neglect of duty because he allowed an uniawful assemblage of people to throng the streets for hours

and failed to use proper means to dis-perse them, and failed to adopt any measures to preserve the peace of the Chief Overton of the police depart-ment is charged with failure or rerusal to disperse a riot or mob, for re-fusal to carry aid to the sheriff upon the summons of that officer and adopting no effective measures for the prevention of the mob.

The action of Gov. Cunningham in sending militia to preserve order is commended and in view of the fact at a court of inquiry is investigating he conduct of the local militia during the riot no comment is made on their actions except that they appear to be under the command of an officer in-competent and ignorant of his duties.

# Heavy Storm in Iowa.

Des Moines, Ia., Sept. 20 .- A terrific wind, hall and rain storm has dam-aged many thousand dollars' worth of property at Oskaloosa. The building occupied by Spencer's wholesale grofirm was demolished, the Illinois Central depot was unroofed, and prac-tically all the business houses were damaged more or less severely. Re-ports from other parts of the state indicate the severity of the storm. At Albia the hail was said to be five inches deep.

Chicago, Sept. 19.-The Western Sup-ply company, 18 West Randolph street, one of the largest farm implement firms in the middle west, was today placed in the hands of a receiver by Judge Kohlsaat, in the United States court. This action followed the filing of a pe-

Only the governments of Germany Austrial, Italy and Roumania have sent special messages of congratulation, The other powers will be represented at the coronation in a merely formal man-ner, and some of them, like Great Britain and Holland, who withdrew thei ministers after the assassination of King Alexander and Queen Draga, are taking practically no part in the affair. In fact, the memory of the regicides still casts a shadow over the court. It is rumored that King Peter receives threatening letters and is constantly in ommunication with the secret police.

# ARMY POST SCHOOLS.

#### Gen. Bates Says no Great Advantage Comes from Them.

Washington, Sept. 19 .- Maj. Gen. J. C Baies, U. S. Al, commanding the northern division, in his annual report to the war department, says that the experience of many years is that no great public advantage is derived from the post schools for enlisted men, and that they should be conducted as night schools with permission for any soldier to attend who so desires.

Gen. Bates urges serious considera-lion of the question of desertions which continue to be quite numerous. The general says that inspection of the different colleges, universities and other institutions of learning within the fmits of the division where an office of an army has been detailed by the war department for duty shows that the amount of military instruction given in the various institutions varies greatly as does the military discipline imposed on the student. He says that the officials at each of these schools should be given to understand that the detail of an officer for duty there will only be given where inspections show that sufficient time and attention ar given to military instruction to insure substantial results.

# LOOKING FOR FILIBUSTERS.

Secret Service Men Looking for Them in New York.

About a month ago New Orleans newspapers contained advertisements that called the attention of the con suls of Honduras government in New Orleans to the efforts of a lieutenant stationed there to raise a company of some 400 men. The newspapers stated at that time that the expedition was being formed by an American firm that has pecuniary interests in Central America to go there and protect its interests. It was said that the ex-pedition was to go to a point about three days distance from New Orleans. Honduras is just that distance from New Orleans. Detectives were put or the matter at the request of the Hon duras government, and it is said they found that about 400 men were to b given uniforms similar to those wor by United States soldiers, with gun and ammunition, and that two rapid fire guns were to be taken along. The detectives learned that an expedition was to start also from New York and another from Pittsburg. The department was notified and the preparations at New Orleans were stopped at once. far as known no preparations

have been made for raising an expedition here.
