LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

Kidnap Escape.—About noon today the delivery horse, with wagon attached, of Mr. Balmforth, grocer, ran away from the front of his place opposite the Walter House. The animal headed directly for the stable and in its owner knocked down a small child, which had a narrow escape from serious injury. Luckily it only received a few slight bruises and scratches.

The Third Case.—J. Canard, the burglar captured on Monday night at the Nichols Smelter, was examined in the police court today on the charge of committing the burglarious robbery of the premises of Mr. Edgington and Mrs. Tait. In default of \$500 bonds the accused was committed to await the action of the grand jury. This makes case number three for which Canard is under commitment.

Incendiarism at Cheyenne.—Cheyenne had three fires early on Monday morning. Chase's old theatre was entirely consumed, and several other buildings had a narrow escape from going to flames. Some small buildings were torn down, and the entire loss is estimated at some where in the neighborhood of \$10,000. Water could not be obtained for quite a while after the fire broke out, and the fire was under good headway before the steamer was got in working order. The fire company from Camp Carlin was on the ground and rendered valuable aid. John P. Shaw, of that company, was injured by a falling roof.

The old theatre building, in which the fire originated, was valued at \$7,000, and was the property of Messrs. Hallack and Howard, of Denver.

The Cheyenne Leader claims that the fire was the work of incendiarism.

Sugar Cane Cultivation.—The raising of sugar cane is a very important part of the Utah farming industry. It has declined somewhat of late years, but is beginning to revive again. It is being gradually discovered that the sugar cane from cane, but which are often considerably deteriorated, are inferior to those made at home. Those who are giving any attention to sugar cane cultivation are mostly getting the superior qualities of seed, from the East, averages, we understand, 25 cents a pound. For the benefit of those who desire to obtain it, we are enabled to state that John B. Wiley, of Nephi, has made a specialty of raising it, and can supply the genuine article at the low figure of five cents a pound. Being produced here it is more likely to grow and flourish than imported seed.

CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION.

At the morning session which commenced at 10 o'clock, the preamble and articles of the Constitution were read by sections up to and including a portion of article six.

In section nine in the article on Bill of Rights, Mr. Bryan moved to insert the words "for her" after the word "his."

Mr. Penrose objected and stated that man embraces woman, and there is a specific law in the statute book which makes the masculine include the feminine. The motion was lost.

Mr. Thoreson moved that the words "State of Deseret" be placed in the Constitution in place of the words "State of Utah."

Mr. Hatch replied that we are known throughout the world as Utah, and the expenses would be great on making necessary changes for legal purposes.

Mr. Penrose was not proud of the name of Utah. It is derived from a dirty, thieving band of Indians; Deseret sounds euphonious and signifies a honey land, and the name is suggestive of industry, and is redolent of blossoms and of flowers.

Mr. Stout said we started out with the name of Deseret for our original organization; Congress had refused that name, and it seems that we want them to take water.

Mr. Caine said we have tried three times to get admission as a State under the name of Deseret and failed, and he wanted to try the name of Utah. Deseret may be a sweet name but it is a sting.

Mr. Mack was in favor of the name of Utah.

Mr. Baty first learned to love the name of Utah from the words of a hymn composed by Mr. Penrose and he loved it still.

Mr. Tanner favored the name of Utah, and said that people can honor a name though a name can do no honor to a people.

The motion to change the name was lost.

In section 6, article 4, on suffrage, Mr. Bryan moved to insert the word "male." He was opposed to bringing the names of our wives, sisters, or daughters, into common use by hoodlums, drunkards and professional politicians. We love gentlemen, modesty, and retirement in women. We want the convention to assert that it did not sanction women assuming the role of men.

Mrs. Kimball replied that she found in every phase of life the sexes were involved by associating together, and she knew of no reason why woman should not have a voice in making the laws for her government as well as man.

The motion was lost.

Mr. Rawlins moved an additional section to article four, providing that each qualified elector may cast as many votes for one candidate as there are representatives to be elected in the county or district. This is a provision for what is known as minority representation. He said it is in the interest of good government for the sentiments of every voter to be heard. An opposition minority can not control a majority, but may offer judicious suggestions. In every country where the majority had unlimited and undisputed sway, errors in legislation had crept in. The motion was lost.

Amendments were offered and adopted to article six, when the convention took recess till 2 p.m.

At the afternoon session, a discussion arose between Messrs. Rawlins, Stout, Penrose, Richards, Thurman and Tanner on the powers conferred upon the legislature in reference to the judiciary, and a sub-committee of five, consisting of Messrs. Rawlins, Richards, Booth, Sharp and Thurman were appointed to consider sections 1 and 6 of article vi. Pending the reading of subsequent articles, the committee returned with an amendment giving power to the legislature to extend limited common law and chancery jurisdiction to other than the circuit courts, adopted.

The Constitution had been considered as far as the XV Article at the time of our going to press. The adjournment will be till 10 a. m. tomorrow.

John H. Freeman's Difficulty.—Yesterday we stated that John H. Freeman was in trouble on Monday, with a number of men whom he had engaged to go to work on the Denver, South Park and Pacific R. R. The cause of the difficulty, as explained by Mr. Freeman himself, was that he had had along had a rate of passage to Denver of \$11 a head for his men, the agreement providing for this amount to be deducted from the first month's pay of each. The railroad officials, he states, objected to carrying the men any longer at that rate. It was not till Monday afternoon that he could get an answer as to what the new rate would be, and in the meantime the men had become impatient. It was then ascertained that the men would not be carried by the railroad for less than ordinary rates, thirty-four dollars each. In consequence of this Mr. Freeman has returned to each man—except two who have not yet applied for it—the two dollars each he had received from them for board and lodgings at Denver.

A Utah Stock Association.—Mr. Samuel Holt, of Logan, favors our suggestion for the organization of a Utah Stock Association. He writes:

"In your paper of the 15th you ask: How would it work to have a Utah Stock Association? I say, let us have one. It is just what we want. We want more unity in this State."

If there is a sufficient number of cattle raisers and graziers, with similar views to those entertained by Mr. Holt, the next thing is to take steps toward organizing. If such an association accomplished more than the protection of Utah stock against the depredations of cattle thieves, who thrive in this western country, it would be a good thing.
