

TYPICAL APPEAL TO DELEGATION Members of Legislature from Boxelder Receive Strong Plea for Prohibition. RESOLUTIONS ACCOMPANY KING Alcohol Arraigned and Representatives Urged by Constituents to Stamp Out Evil in Utah.

Charging you the present legislature has been sold to the liquor interests, Franklin D. Welling of Garland county delegation to stand firm and vote for state-wide prohibition. The communication accompanies a set of resolutions passed by the Mutual Improvement Association of Boxelder county, and is emphatic in its denunciation of alcoholic sales in Utah. It is as follows:

To the Honorable, William C. Hensley, Senator, and Willard S. Hanson, representative, representing us from Boxelder County to the Eighth Legislative Assembly of the State of Utah.

Dear Sirs: I take the liberty of addressing you on the subject of prohibition in the State of Utah. From some reports which have gained currency in this locality, there seems to be some uncertainty as to your position upon the question of prohibition, some averring that you lean toward county local option.

As one of your constituency, representing a considerable number of young men of your county, I desire to urge you most strongly and earnestly to stand pat upon this question. We want state-wide prohibition by all means, first, last and all the time, and ask you to accept no compromise. We ask you to make no deal with the heart and soul for the one great para-oxymoron, state-wide prohibition. If you ask "why?" I answer, because the young manhood of this great state demands it. It is the honor that is not chosen by the suffrage of your party, a party that gave its pledge in convention to work for prohibition, to represent not only them but all the people of this great county in this most important legislative assembly.

The legislators of the State of Utah are called upon to confront the great enemy of our time, to handle the greatest living question. The monster "King Alcohol" has the world for a home, the flesh for a mother, and the devil for a father. He stands next, a monster of fabulous proportions. He has no heart and can not see, he has no eyes and cannot see, he has no ears and cannot hear. He has only an instinct by which to plan, a coil by which to bind, a flag by which to sting, and an infinite way in which to consume his victims. We beseech this monster, and arraign him before the bar of public judgment, and demand his condemnation in the name of industry, robbed and ruined, of the public peace, disturbed and broken, of private justice, gagged and garbled, of common safety, violated and trampled, of popular conscience, despoiled and prostituted, of the honest, wrecked and ruined, and of helpless innocence, waylaid and assassinated.

"Should Utah Adopt Prohibition" (The Inter-Mountain Republican, April 7, 1923) THAT Utah and the northwest generally are not entirely out of the running when it comes to agitation against the saloon business, as it is carried on at present, has been evidenced of late in many ways. Several of the smaller communities of Utah have done without saloons for many years, and in others the agitation against the saloons has recently grown to large proportions. In still other cases, the saloons are trying to get into towns where formerly they had none. Springville is an example of the last mentioned, and those residents of Springville that fought the proposal, while they acknowledge that they were almost taken by surprise in a sudden attack made by the saloon interests, believe, nevertheless, that no saloon will come to Springville.

Considerable strength was lent to the anti-saloon agitation in Mount Pleasant by the killing there, recently, of a man as a result of a fight that had its immediate origin in a saloon. The city of Lehi was equally stirred by a homicide that was traced directly to liquor traffic. And power has been lent to the opponents of the saloons in other communities, recently, by alleged crimes said to be due to the influence of drink. In Salt Lake, the evidence taken in the Sullivan trial has furnished ammunition for those who desire to have eradicated the low dives where criminals gather and concert plans for breaking the laws. And it is declared that the places visited by Sullivan, Garcia and Owen on the night that Policeman Charles Ford was murdered, are not the only places in the city where such gatherings are no uncommon occurrence.

From Rexburg, Idaho, comes an expression of opinion that might be said to represent the views of a very considerable element in various Utah towns. A correspondent writes: "The prohibition wave which is spreading throughout the country has reached Idaho in reality. During the recent legislature the local option law was carefully considered and it will probably be one of the important subjects at the next session. The liquor interests have recently had large posters placed in conspicuous places, telling of the benefits of the liquor traffic. It tells how many men are employed, and of the ready market that the farmers have for their grain. The posters neglected, however, to state the unlimited amount of misery that the saloons cause and the thousands of little children and faithful wives who wait for the return of fathers and husbands, who spend their incomes to promote the liquor traffic.

"There seems to be a feeling that Rexburg has too many saloons now, and that they should be curtailed if not completely closed, and it is hoped thereby to prevent a duplication of the trouble which recently resulted in a brutal murder here." A news item from Richmond contains the following: "At the regular priesthood meeting of the Benson stake, the temperance question was the principal theme discussed. It was the prevailing sentiment that the time is now ripe for action and all were willing to join any movement that would be the means of driving this evil from the state. The liquor traffic has so increased in this vicinity that the people are becoming alarmed, and it is quite probable that the candidates for the legislature this fall will be compelled to stand on a platform pledged to prohibition or county local option."

Such rightly woe, millions of victims have fallen by his oppression, millions are enthralled. Year after year and age after age have passed away, but the cry of remonstrance, though often raised, has seldom been heard of heed. The malignant tyrant steady to his purpose, has noted in the courage and with infernal exultation, mock at the groans of the dying, and sported with the widow's sighs and orphan's tears. Every domestic and social bond has been disregarded, the peace and respectability of families have been destroyed; promising and beloved sons torn from their parents, husbands from their wives and families, and the tender mother from the helpless and dependent offspring. No life in nature too tender to be sullied, no chord too strong to be broken by this unfeeling tyrant. For the above reasons we ask and expect you to take a firm and unwavering stand in favor of state-wide prohibition. It has been urged by some that to kill this diabolical traffic in human souls at a blow would not be fair on account of the great loss to the brewers and saloon men in the state. Such a notion, if they were to be allowed, is a gross injustice. To answer this unscrupulous argument one needs only to cite the fact that it is getting rid of the traffic, and that the people do not want. Can you teach off a cannon a little at a time? No.

ONE DETERMINED STAND. One bold and valiant stroke, one determined stand, one decisive cut and the victory is won. Utah takes her place among her sisters a clean, white state, even though it be after nearly 50 years of teaching of temperance and wisdom. Again, if every brewery and saloon man were to lose all they have and all fortunes they very poorly expiate the crimes they have committed during the years of licensed traffic in alcoholic liquors. Such a loss, if they were made willingly and in a cheerful spirit might help them to obtain forgiveness. Again my dear Sir, trusting that your constituency will not be disappointed in your work upon this all important subject, but on the contrary that they may have the happy privilege of pointing with personal pride and pleasure to the fact that our

LITTLE MORE TIME WITH MUCH MORE HALF THE TIME IS GONE FOR THE LEGISLATURE AND "WAIT AWHILE" IS THE MOTTO. PROMISE OF DES MOINES BILL. Lively Discussion Will Probably Be Forthcoming When Measure Reaches The Floor—Salary Raised.

With the Utah legislature now at a point where more than half of its time is behind it, nearly all of its work is still ahead. In the senate, quiet half-hours, disturbed only once by a debate of any proportions and this on an inconsequential subject, have been the unbroken rule. The temperance measures in that body repose peacefully in Kuehler's committee and no action is taken, while as an excuse it is stated that the senate is waiting on the house, and the Cannon bill. In this they realize that the measure introduced by Gardner and by Hulanicki are mere subterfuges, not intended for serious consideration, but only to delay action, to afford committee excuses for not reporting on the grounds that they are weighing the value of various portions of various bills.

The Des Moines plan of government measure, the public service commission measure, and the prohibition measure would each seem to be matters calling for extensive treatment. The prospect now is that none of them will reach the upper house in open session in time to be considered, except in the final rush when everything is subordinated to the need for immediate adjournment. In such a rush most of the important matters before the last session would likely be considered and many were left to be reintroduced in this legislature merely because there was no opportunity at the session's end to save them from the general wreckage.

DES MOINES BILL. These Des Moines system bill brought in yesterday afternoon will form a subject of keen controversy if it ever gets upon the floor of the senate for final passage. Two years ago this measure ran counter to the first and last commission bill, which then had many advocates who saw in it a substitute to the commission plan of government for Salt Lake. It was considered in caucus under the name of the "Cleveland plan" and was given the support of the Salt Lake delegation. After that it passed the senate and failed in the house where a determined assault was made to force the issue on the floor and police commission measure. The bill is now up in both house and senate, where it is before committees who will report it back at their pleasure. The large amount of support given the measure by the people of Salt Lake represented by the Civic Improvement League, will probably count for its early consideration. Meanwhile the name of each individual advanced in the prohibition question, sits by and watches the tactical move of friend and foe of the bill in the house.

LITTLE BUSINESS DONE. The senators have no prohibition bills of their own in which to exercise their skill at law making, and they can't get their minds off that one in the house long enough to absorb themselves in other legislation of an important nature.

The session yesterday afternoon brought but little to do in the shape of passing measure, or considering committee reports on bills that have been in for weeks.

Senator Sevy thought the supreme court stenographer deserved a bigger salary, and the senate thought so too after discussing for some time a bill to increase it to \$1,500 from \$1,200. Senator Williams raised objection on the ground that the stenographer might earn money outside of what the state paid him. Senator Hulanicki read a statement of the needs of the stenographer, and after this statement had been read the bill was passed.

"The table is clear, gentlemen," announced President Gardner after this amount of work had been done by the accomplishments of the third day.

"I move we adjourn," put in a senator, and the body ceased to exist, while each member pondered for the door or for a committee room, where the work was up for consideration that will mark today's grind.
