## "Should Utah Adopt Prohibition"

HAT Utah and the northwest generally are not entirely out of the running when it comes to agitation against the saloon business, as it is carried on at present, has been evidenced of late in many ways. Soveral of the smaller communities of Utah have done without saloens for many years, and in others the agitation against the salouns has recently grown to large proportions. In still other cases, the saloun are trying to get into towns where formerly they had hone. Springville is an example of the last mentioned and those residents of Springville that fought the proposal, while they acknowledge that they were almost taken by surprise in a sudden attack made by the salcon interests, believe, nevertheless, that no salcon will come to

Considerable strength was lent to the anti-saloen agitation in Mount Pleasant by the killing there, recent ly, of a men as a result of a fight that had its immediate origin in a saloon. The city of Leht was equally stirred by a hemicide that was traced directly to liquor traffic. And power has been lent to the appenents of the saloons in other communities, recently, by alleged crimes said to be due to the influence of drink

In Salt Lake, the evidence taken in the Sullivan trial has furnished ammunition for those who desire to have eradicated the low dives where criminals gather and concost plans for breaking the laws. And it is declared that the places visited by Sullivan, Garcia and Owen on the night that Policeman Charles Ford was murdered, are not the only places in the city where such gatherings are no uncommon occurrence

From Rexburg, Idaho, comes an expression of opinion that might be said to represent the views of a very considerable element in various Utah towns. A correspondent writes:

The prohibition wave which is spreading throughout the country has reached Idaho in reality.
