ander sent the following telegram to the Czar through the Russian consulate at Rustchuk: "Sire-Having re-assumed the gov-ernment of Bulgaria, I venture to offer to your Imperial Majesty my most re-spectful thanks for the action of your consul at Rustchuk, whose official presence at my reception showed the Bulgarians that Russia did not approve of the revolutionary act directed at any person. I also thank your Imperial Majesty for dispatching Prince Dolgo-rouki as envoy extraordinary to Bul-garia. My first act on resuming power is to assure your Majesty's magnanimous intention to make every sacridee to forward your Majesty's magnanimous intention to extracte Bulgaria from the grave crisis through which she is passing. I beg of your Majesty that you will authorize Prince Dolgorouki to place himseli in direct communication with myseli as speedily as possible. I shall be happy to give Your Majesty decided proofs of my unalterable devotion to your august person. The monarchial principle compels me to restore the legality of my crown in Bulgaria and Roumelia. Russia having given me my crown, it is luto the hands of Bussia's sovereign I am ready to ren-der it."

The mission of Prince Dolgorouki has become inexpedient. I shall abstain, so long as Your High-ness remains in Bulgaria, from auy in-tervention in the sad condition to which the country is reduced. Your Highness must decide your own course. I reserve to myself to judge what my father's venerated memory, the interests of Russia and the peace of the East require of me." BERLIN, 2.—Private telegrams re-ceived here this evening from Sofia state that a hattle took place at Rado-mir, in Eastern Roumelia, between the regiments siding with the rev-olutionists, and that the latter were defeated with heavy losses. London, 8.—A violeut outbreak of cholera is reported at Tarredell, Annu-zabla, near Maples, in consequence of which the religious festival has been prohibited by the town authorities.

which the religious festival has been prohibited by the town authorities. Rome, 3.—The cholera returns for the whole of Italy show 109 new cases of cholera and 41 deaths. LONDON, 3.—An attempt was made to wreck the train conveying Prince Alexander to Sofia. When near Phil-Ilppopolis the engineer discovered an obstruction on the track, and brought the train to a standatill. On investi-gation it was found that five sleepers had been placed across the rails. A conflict between the revolutionists and followers of Alexander is feared at Sofia.

Alexander, when he reached Bucharest on his journey to Sofia, telegraphed to the Sultan assurances of his homage and direction.

A grand council, amoug the members of which are M. Stambuloff and Karaveloff, is being held to arrange for the regency. The Prince will probably leave within two days. The officers of the army are greatly excited and talk of detaining the Prince. They have resolved, in any case, to refuse to receive the Russian envoy. They will hold a meeting to decide what course to adopt. The city is tranguil. VIENNA, 4.—The Neus Freie Presse publishes a dispatch from Soda stating that M. Kartueloff, head of the revolu tionary party which deposed Prince Alexander, has been released from police supervision. The Russian party in Sofia say that Major Greuff, who took a leading part in the coup d' etat, had resolved at the time upon killing Prince Alexander, and was pre-vented from carrying out his resolve by the intervention of the Rus-sian consul. It is not now believed that Prince Alexander will abdicate but that he will summon the Bulgarian assembly and submit the question of abdicating, or cortinuing on the throne, to that body for decision. Powerful influences are being exerted from several different quarters to bring about a union of Bulgaria, Servia and Roumania. PHILIPPOPOLIS, 5.—Prince Alexander Roumania.

inst. Athens, 5.—The Ephemerisu states that Prince Alexander has notified the Czar of his abdication of the throne of Bulgaria. Sofia, 5.—Thousands of copies of the Czar's reply to Prince Alexander have been printed by order of the Russian consul, and distributed among the people. It is believed that Russia will give the throne to the Duke of Olden-burg who is commander of the cavalry division at St. Petersburg and a favor-ite of the Czar.




