FOREIGN.

**PHILIPPOLIS, 2.**—The city is gaily decorated in honor of the return of Prince Alexander to Bulgaria and is crowded with visitors come to join the citizens in celebrating the event. An enthusiastic popular demonstration was held yesterday in front of the British Consulate in honor of Alexander, and a counter demonstration in favor of the revolutionists was at the same time held in front of the Russian Consulate.

**DUBLIN, 2.**—United Ireland says the era of the extermination of the land lords has commenced in Ireland. "We don't owe them anything," United Ireland says, "and we don't feel any pity for them. The Irish landlords are modern, impudent thieves. The Irish tenants are fighting literally for dear life. Final victory is assured to them."

**BERLIN, 2.**—Yesterday being the anniversary of the battle of Sedan, Emperor William and Empress Augusta reviewed 20,000 troops at Potsdam.

**ST. PETERSBURG, 2.**—Prince Alexander sent the following telegram to the Czar through the Russian consulate at Rastchuk:

"Sire—Having re-assumed the government of Bulgaria, I venture to offer to your Imperial Majesty my most respectful thanks for the action of your council at Rastchuk, whose official presence at my reception showed the Bulgarians that Russia did not approve of the revolutionary act directed at my person. I also thank your Imperial Majesty for dispatching Prince Dolgorouki as envoy extraordinary to Bulgaria. My first action on resuming power is to assure your Majesty of my firm intention to make every sacrifice to forward your Majesty's magnanimous intention to extricate Bulgaria from the grave crisis through which she is passing. I beg of your Majesty that you will authorize Prince Dolgorouki to place himself in direct communication with myself as speedily as possible. I shall be happy to give your Majesty decided proofs of my unalterable devotion to your august person. The monarchical principle compels me to restore the legality of my crown in Bulgaria and Roumelia. Russia having given me my crown, it is into the hands of Russia's sovereign I am ready to render it."

The Czar replied to Alexander as follows:

"I cannot approve of your return to Bulgaria, foreseeing from it sinister consequences for a country already so sorely tried. The mission of Prince Dolgorouki has become inexpedient. I shall abstain, so long as your Highness remains in Bulgaria, from any intervention in the sad condition to which the country is reduced. Your Highness must decide your own course. I reserve to myself to judge what my father's venerated memory, the interests of Russia and the peace of the East require of me."

**BERLIN, 2.**—Private telegrams received here this evening from Sofia state that a battle took place at Radomir, in Eastern Roumelia, between the regiments loyal to Prince Alexander and the regiments siding with the revolutionists, and that the latter were defeated with heavy losses.

**LONDON, 3.**—A violent outbreak of cholera is reported at Tarredell, Annuzabla, near Naples, in consequence of which the religious festival has been prohibited by the town authorities.

**Rome, 3.**—The cholera returns for the whole of Italy show 109 new cases of cholera and 41 deaths.

**LONDON, 3.**—An attempt was made to wreck the train conveying Prince Alexander to Sofia. When near Philippopolis the engineer discovered an obstruction on the track, and brought the train to a standstill. On investigation it was found that five sleepers had been placed across the rails.

A conflict between the revolutionists and followers of Alexander is feared at Sofia.

**SOBIA, 3.**—The revolutionary regiments here have surrendered unconditionally to Alexander and appealed to him for clemency.

Bulgaria is now tranquil. Alexander, when he reached Bucharest on his journey to Sofia, telegraphed to the Sultan assurances of his homage and devotion.

**LONDON, 3.**—The Daily Telegraph this morning, commenting on the Bulgarian revolution, says: Russia has already secretly spent 18,000,000 francs in Bulgaria. Just before the revolution the Russian consul at Sofia withdrew £70,000 in Turkish money from a well known Eastern bank ostensibly to endow certain religious communities which nobody was aware were in pecuniary straits.

**PARIS, 4.**—It is reported here that within the past few days 50 Russian officers of Muffi have arrived separately at Sofia, and placed themselves in communication with the Zankoff faction of the revolutionists.

**Sofia, 4.**—Prince Alexander has announced publicly his intention of abdicating. He says he cannot remain in Bulgaria on account of the objections of the Czar. Before leaving he will establish a regency.

Prince Alexander made an address at a reception given by him to the officers of the army in which he made the following statement: "The independence of Bulgaria requires that I leave the country. If I did not Russia would occupy it. I will, however, consult with the superior officers and consti-

tute a regency which will endeavor to protect the interests of my officers. In any case, I rely on the army." Prince Alexander imparted his intention of abdicating to the German and Russian Consuls. A grand council, among the members of which are M. Stambuloff and Karaveloff, is being held to arrange for the regency. The Prince will probably leave within two days. The officers of the army are greatly excited and talk of dethroning the Prince. They have resolved, in any case, to refuse to receive the Russian envoy. They will hold a meeting to decide what course to adopt. The city is tranquil.

**VIENNA, 4.**—The Neue Freie Presse publishes a dispatch from Sofia stating that M. Karteloff, head of the revolutionary party which deposed Prince Alexander, has been released from police supervision. The Russian party in Sofia say that Major Greuff, who took a leading part in the coup d'etat, had resolved at the time upon killing Prince Alexander, and was prevented from carrying out his resolve by the intervention of the Russian consul. It is not now believed that Prince Alexander will abdicate but that he will summon the Bulgarian assembly and submit the question of abdicating or continuing on the throne, to that body for decision. Powerful influences are being exerted from several different quarters to bring about a union of Bulgaria, Servia and Roumania.

**PHILIPPOLIS, 5.**—Prince Alexander has issued a decree summoning the National Assembly to meet on the 11th inst.

**Athens, 5.**—The Ephemeris states that Prince Alexander has notified the Czar of his abdication of the throne of Bulgaria.

**Sofia, 5.**—Thousands of copies of the Czar's reply to Prince Alexander have been printed by order of the Russian consul, and distributed among the people. It is believed that Russia will give the throne to the Duke of Oldenburg who is commander of the cavalry division at St. Petersburg and a favorite of the Czar.

**Sofia, 6.**—Before Alexander announced his intention to quit the throne, he received a telegram from Bismarck recommending that he abdicate, in order to save Bulgaria.
