I understand that there was considerable dissatisfaction expressed last season against the Carder whom I employed, because of the wool being poorly carded, cut up, etc., though he pro-fessed to be an excellent carder: this season I intend to remedy this, and if good work cannot be done I will stop the machine; for I believe that justice ought to be done to customers.
Give us clean, well-picked wool and we will give you good rolls. My price for carding is 121/2 cents per pound in gold or its equivalent, or onesixth of the wool.
