FOREIGN.

GREAT BRITAIN.

London, 4.—A dispatch from Rome says that Isabella has requested the Pope to use his influence with King Alfonso to dissuade him from contracting a marriage with a princess not of the Catholic faith.

RUSSIAN WAR ITEMS.

A dispatch from Galatz says about fifty shots were exchanged between the Russian batteries at Ibrail and the Turkish turret ship and gunboat. The Russian batteries and town were uninjured.

It is certain that the Russians will bridge the Danube below its junction with the Pruth, and also at Turne, nearly opposite Nilsopolis. There will doubtless be intermediate bridges.

The Russian engineers have bought a steam tug from an English firm here to be used in the construction of the first bridge, and a tug and some barges at Turne for the second.

No fresh troops have recently crossed the Pruth towards Galatz, but a large mass is concentrated on the further side.

A torpedo depot has been established at the mouth of the Pruth. Six hundred engineers and sailors constitute the torpedo detachment there.

A dispatch reports that Austria has recalled all the Austrian officers in the Turkish service.

A special frigate, Klischnoff says numbers of Bulgarians, arriving here, are being formed into battalions and officered by Russians. It is expressed that one, numbering at least 10,000 men, will be formed of Bulgarians who have fled into Roumania.

A Vienna correspondent reports that Austria has not protested against the stoppage of the navigation of the Danube, and will not do so, as she wishes to preserve her own cause in the event of her ever having to use the Danube for military operations.

At Constantinople the press law of 1868 is suspended, and newspapers placed altogether under administrative control. The Chamber of Deputies are discussing the ministerial bill for proclaiming a state of siege here.

The Porte notified the representatives of the Powers, yesterday, that it had declared a blockade of the whole Russian coast of the Black Sea. A delay of three days will be granted to vessels wishing to enter, and five days to those intending to leave the Black Sea.

Moukhtar Pasha announces that the Russians are advancing in great force toward Kara, with the object of cutting off Turkish communication with Erzerum.

The Turkish commander at Kara has marched out with nine battalions, and occupied Izbahlik.

A telegram from the Turkish commander at Batoum says the Russian military operations were arrested by rainy weather.

A committee of the assembly having decided upon the imposition of an extraordinary war tax of 2480,000, the Khedive has telegraphed to Constantinople that the Egyptian contingent now in Turkey, numbering 9,000 men, will be raised to 12,000. The remainder of the Egyptian contingent will be kept in Egypt for the protection of the Suez Canal.

The Bucharest official journal publishes the Prince's assent to the convention with Russia.

It is reported that the bombardment of Ibrail and Barboschi recommenced yesterday evening.

The Turkish circular of May 2nd has been presented to this government. The Porte protests against a Franco-Rouman convention as illegal and facilitating intrigues.

The Montenegrins hold the dug-pass, blockading Nicsic and Goranako.

Suleiman Pasha, with 20,000 men, is marching to relieve Goranako. Severe fighting is expected.

The Turks have persuaded 20,000 South Albanians to take arms on condition that Montenegro will be given up to plunder.

WALLACHIA.

The Bombardment of Ibrail. BUCHAREST, 4.—In the chamber of deputies, yesterday, the minister of foreign affairs, in reply to a question concerning the bombardment of Ibrail, stated that the Russian batteries fired first upon the Turks, who, in reply, fired upon the residence of the Prefect. There was slight loss of life, and one house was destroyed. This occurrence, although regrettable, was not intended by the Turks. The minister concluded by saying that he had opposed every solicitation to declare the independence of Roumania, and that the country did not consider itself a state of war with Turkey.
