The military establishment of the King of Italy has been officially apprised that their future residence is to be at Florence, where the Court is definitely fixed.

Dr. Nettleton adopted the following as a maxim for the government of his life—"Do all the good you can in the world, and make as little noise as possible about it."

It is reported from Malta that shocks of earthquake have been lately felt at Corfu. It is said that a mountain near Arta has thrown out smoke and flame, and that a village in the neighborhood has been destroyed, with two or three hundred of its inhabitants.

The French government has sent M. Edmond Duthoit, a well-known architect, to Asia Minor, to take drawings of the ancient monuments and works of art existing at Assos, on the Bosphorus. This town is of great antiquity, having been frequently mentioned by the Athenian historians and orators from Miltiades to Demosthenes. The walls and gates still remaining are at least as ancient as the time of Alexander the Great.

Railroading in Italy is described by a correspondent as rather dangerous. The road from Bologna to Pistoja, for instance, is in the worst possible condition, with banks delightfully propped up, and bridges that may go down any moment.

The engine is conscious of danger, and feels its way in a romantically cautious style, ready to draw back if necessary and not too late. Altogether the journey is as good as a sensation novel in three volumes—nay, this trip offers you the prospect of a more startling conclusion."

Chalil Bey, the Turkish ambassador, has presented to the Emperor of Russia, for the Museum of the Hermitage, a magnificent collection of antiquities discovered in excavations in Egypt, and among others fifteen figures in bronze inlaid with gold and silver, a statue of an Osiris in a standing posture, and another in a sitting one; also a cat consecrated to Osiris, and several statuettes of kings, of which three belong to the period of the Ethiopian Pharaohs. There are also some remarkable pieces of the Ptolomean period, and among them a bust of Serapis and the bust of a queen with the attributes of Isis.

Liverier, the astronomer, has just received a letter dated Rio de Janeiro, January 22, announcing that on the preceding night a magnificent comet was observed there. Its length was between eight and nine degrees, its breadth between forty and fifty minutes. As the sky was somewhat cloudy, a regular observation could not be taken. The inclination of the tail to the horizon was about seventy-five and eighty degrees; it was nearly the same breadth throughout.

Paysanda, the South American town so recently bombarded, presents a sad appearance. The place was sacked, and dead bodies left to rot and decay in the streets. The statue of Liberty in the public square of Paysanda was pulled down and destroyed, and for days after the square itself was strewn with broken guns, knapsacks, cartridge-boxes, sabres, caps by the hundreds, cannon and rifle balls, bottles and official documents.

Affairs in Buenos Ayres, according to the papers there, are anything but satisfactory. The city itself is so neglected by the municipality, that diseases, hitherto unknown, are making ravages. The river is so forgotten by the government that the ordinary channels for navigation are becoming impeded by sunken wrecks and moving sand-banks, and the greatest blame is attached to the President for allowing party spirit to set at defiance the authority of the laws of the land.

The work of spanning the Thames with railway bridges is still progressing. Feb. 22d the foundationstone of the new Pimlico bridge of the London, Chatham and Dover Railroad Company—the second structure of the kind originated by that corporation—was laid with the usual ceremonies, by Lord Harris. The bridge is to have five arches, and to be a counterpart of the present Victoria bridge, but very much wider.

A 20-inch gun has been made at Pittsburg to throw 1,080 pound shot, the charge of powder being 100 pounds. This monster piece of ordnance, known as "Beelzebub," was tested lately, in presence of a number of officers, and the trial gave great satisfaction to all interested.

A submarine lantern has been invented which has been used with success to illuminate the bottom of the Bay of Cronstadt in Russia.

AIM AT SOMETHING.—Arthur Gilman, in one of his public addresses, tells what he calls "an Andover story." One day, he says, a man went into a store there, and began telling about a fire. "There had never been such a fire," he said, "in the county of Essex. A man going by Deacon Pettingill's barn saw an owl on the ridge-pole. He fired at the owl, and the wadding somehow or other getting into the shingles, set the hay on fire, and it was all destroyed—ten tons of hay, six head of cattle, the finest horse in the country," &c. The deacon was nearly crazed by it. The men in the store began exclaiming and commenting upon it. "What a loss!" says one. "Why, the deacon will well nigh break down under it," says another, and so they went on, speculating one after another, and the conversation drifted on in all sorts of conjectures. Let all public speakers, in the pulpit and elsewhere, heed the moral. Did you aim at something, and did you hit what you aimed at? No matter about the splurge, and the smoke, and the hay—"Did you hit that owl?"
