# Tom O'Nell Shot-Deed Laid to Jim

Special Correspondence. Cheyenne, Wyo., Feb. 9.—The Weld county, Colo., range feud has broken out afresh, and Tom O'Nell, one of the feudists, lies at his Chalk Bluffs ranch, wounded in both legs. The iden-ily of the person who shot him is not O'Nell was out rounding up cattle O'Nell was out rounding up cattle near his ranch yesterday, and while dismounting was shot through the left leg, the bullet, a 30-30, lodging in the fleshy part of the right leg above the knee. He made his way home and summoned a surgeon by telephone from Cheyenne. Sheriff Smalley of this coun-ty, and Sheriff Elorence of Weld coun-Chevenne. Shariff Smalley of this coun-ty, and Sheriff Florence of Weld coun-ty, Colo., were notified, and today they are investigating the matter. O'Nell and Jim Boyles, neighbors, have been quarreling for several years. Each says the other is to blame. There have been frequent depredations com-mitted in the Chalk Bluffs country, and each man charges the other with the each man charges the other with the crime. Two years ago some one broke into Boyle's cabin and poisoned the food supply. Boyle became deathly slck, but in time recovered. The iden-tity of the person who poisoned the food was never disclosed, although Boyle charged O'Neil with the crime. A few weeks ago a horse was shot from under one of O'Neil's cowboys while rounding up cattle near the Colo-rado line, and O'Neil charged Boyle with the act of outlawry. A few days ago the dividing fence between O'Neil and Boyle was cut by unknown persous, permitting the stock of the warring ranchmen to become mixed, and yesterday O'Nell was shot. Boyle and his foreman were in Cheyenne all day yesterday so they could not have fired the shots, but O'Neil charges Boyle with hiring the assassin to do the work. Held That Smathers Won Gold Cap At Memphis By Doping Rival Horse,

New York, Feb. 13 .- The alleged "doping" of Lou Dillon at Memphis in 1904 will be thoroughly investigated by the board of review of the National Trotting association. This action was decided upon yesterday at the Murray Hill hotel, weare the biennial congress of the National Trotting association was held. It is said that the case will be decided at the next meeting of the board of review.

E. E. Smathers, who, it is alleged, en-fered into a conspiracy to "dope" Lou Di-lon, visited Major P. P. Johnstone, the president of the National Troiting asso-ciation. He was instructed to submit the request in writing, which he did later in the day. The compliant, after reciting the charges, characterizes them as false and malicious and absolutely groundless, and demands that they be made the subject of an investigation without delay. ### LOU DILLON DOPED.

Veterinarian Admits Administering Belladona in Large Dose,

Belladona in Large Dose. San Francisco. Feb. 4.—An affidavit was made today in connection with the race at Memphis between Major Delmar and Lou Dillon. The affidavit is sworn to by A. H. Fehr, a veterinary surgeon, who claims he was the official veterina-rian of the Memphis Racing association at the time the horses contested for the \$5,000 gold cup. In his sworn statement Fehr says: "At the time of the trotting race meet-hig at Memphis when the celebrated race between Major Delmar, belonging to E. E. Smathers and Lou Dillon, the prop-erty of C. K. G. Billings, was trotted, I was employed in the position of official veterinarian of the association and was also in the employ of C. K. G. Billings. "After the first heat between Major Delmar and Lou Dillon was trotted I was summoned by Mutray Howe in a great hirst fhing he said to me was that Lou Dillon had an attack of the 'thumps' or what we technically term in the profe-sion spasmodice contraction of the dia-phragm..

what we technically term in the procession spasmodioc contraction of the dia-phragm. "I work to the stall where the mare had been taken immediately after the first heat. She was closely guarded by a spec-tal officer and Murray Howe, who was at the time the personal representative of Mr. Billings, directed me to treat the mare for the thumps. I examined her and found nothing wrong with the mare more than some nervousness such as any horse would show after coming out of a hard race. Mr. Howe hashed that the mare should be treated for thumps and of course it is commonly known that bellar-donna is the drug used in such cases. It is also common knowledge that such a drug will deaden any animal and kill speed. Therefore, acting under orders, I administered an abnormal dose of the drug, which was sufficient to kill the speed of the strongest and fastest horse in the world for the time being. Under those circumstances it was impossible for Lou Dillon to win the Memphis cup."
