Race Track Service Discontinued by the Western Union.

Western Union. New York, May 18.—Following his ac-tion in discontinuing to all subscribers in this city a report of the racing at vari-ous tracks in this country. Colonel Rob-ert C. Clowry today notlined the general superintendents of the company at New York, Chicago, Atlanta and San Fran-cisco that the collection and distribution by the Western Union Telegram com-pany of horse race reports would be dis-continued forthwith. The text of the no-tice to the superintendents reads as fol-lows:

OW8: "It has been decided to discontinue forthwith the collection and distribution by this company of horse race reports. You will please act accordingly. Ac-knowledge receipt. "(Signed) ROBERT C. CLOWRY, "President and General Manager."

"Gigned ROBERT C. CLOWRY, "President and General Manager," The effect of this order is farreaching and will result in the discontinuance of what has been called the racing depart-ment of the Western Union company. This department has collected and dis-tributed racing news from all the vari-ous tracks in the country to subscribers. Hereafter the company will transmit only such messages concerning races as are regularly filed with it for transmission. For the present Western Union offices as has been the habit in the past will be maintained at race tracks for trans-mission of prepaid dispatches and pri-vate dispatches, but these offices may be discontinued later. The executive committee of the West-ern Union had a brief meeting today at which were present Chauncey M. De-pew Morris K. Jessaup, Russell Suge, Samuel Slean and Jacob H. Schief.
