## TORN TO SHREDS.

Boys of the Louisville Legion Hurled to Death

## BY A POWDER-EXPLOSION.

Deadly Limbs Scattered for Blocks Around.

## BLAZE SPREAD OVER THE CITY

Introducing the Firstfruits Issue

Louisville, Ky., Sept. 11.—A bot-  
tom explosion resulting in the death  
of several members of the Louisville legions  
occurred shortly after 10:30 this morning,  
by the explosion of a cannon. The

The accident occurred on Broadway,  
between Third and Fourth streets  
near the First Kentucky artillery  
battalion for the purpose of driving  
an armful of horses.

By witness of the explosion was caused by the

of the place. Two bodies were  
seen over the rooftops and horribly  
mangled. The wounded were re-  
moved to the hospital. Two horses  
stamped to the ground when the  
explosion occurred, and were killed.

The whole field of Cohn's horse  
was torn and should be removed, as  
it was filled and nearly dislodged.  
Horses were badly burned about the  
head, neck, and body, and the  
limbs were torn off the street, owing to the  
very heat, or the fact of killed and  
injured would undoubtedly have been  
greatly increased. Every window in  
the houses in the neighborhood was  
broken, and the windows of the  
adjacent buildings were broken.

At least a dozen persons were  
killed and many more were  
injured.
