### AFFAIRS OF WEBER COUNTY

Business Transacted by the City Council in Regular Session Last Night.

### Damage Suit and Other District Court Hearings—Another Unhappy Marriage—Ogden Milling Co.

Suit was filed in the Second district court by A. E. Briggs through his attorney, A. J. Weber, against the Carbonate Hill Mining company, to secure judgment in the sum of \$2,076.81, in settlement of a stated account due April 1, 1901.

### DISTRICT COURT.

The following matters came before Judge Rolapp yesterday:

State of Utah vs James Ryan and John Allen, charged with burglarizing an Oregon Short Line car and taking therefrom a quantity of merchandise. The defendants entered a plea of not guilty.

State of Utah vs James Hope; Information was filed by District Attorney Hayes charging the defendant with burglarizing the Catholic church on the night of Oct. 12, 1901, and stealing therefrom articles to the value of \$20. He was granted until November 13 to plead. Valentine Gideon was appointed to defend him.

In the case of Fisher vs Taylor, by stipulation, judgment was rendered in favor of the plaintiff in the sum of \$325, as against the defendant.

The case of Agnes Burt vs The Utah Light and Power company is still occupying the attention of the court. Testimony for the defense is now being taken.

In the case of Hoyt vs Thomas and Odell, suit brought for \$300 alleged to be due for money advanced, recently taken under advisement, Judge Rolapp gave his decision in the case, dismissing the same.

### ANOTHER UNHAPPY MARRIAGE.

Mrs. Clara Trunkhill has brought suit against her husband, Louis Trunkhill, to secure a decree of divorce on the plea of non-support and habitual drunkenness. The parties were taken under advisement, Judge Rolapp gave his decision in the case, dismissing the same.

### OGDEN MILLING COMPANY.

At a recent meeting of the shareholders of the Ogden Milling & Elevator company, Joseph S. Peery was elected a director to represent the estate of D. H. Peery, deceased. A dividend was declared and the following officers were elected: James Mack, president and manager of the mill; George A. Love, Joseph Clark, A. Lindley, superintendent and general sales agent; Joseph S. Peery, vice president and Henry Mack, secretary. The directors are David Eccles, F. J. Kiesel, George A. Love, Joseph Clark, James Mack, L. S. Hills and J. S. Peery.

### WEBER COUNTY BUSINESS.

At the meeting of the county commissioners yesterday, Commissioner Wilson reported the roads in Utah district in good condition.

For the painting of the roof, cornice and window sashes, etc., of the court house, the bid of P. T. Smyth for \$131 was the lowest and was accepted.

Commissioner Skeen was appointed to vote the shares of stock of Weber county at the annual and special meeting of the Weber and Davis Counties Canal company to be held Nov. 16, 1901.

Chairman Stanford reports that in his opinion the Oregon Short Line Railroad company had entered upon Weber county land at the county infirmary in their building a switch to the canal factory at Roy. The matter was referred to the county attorney and Commissioner Stanford for investigation.

Several tax matters were referred to the tax committee and the board adjourned for one week.

### CITY COUNCIL.

City council met in regular session last evening and transacted the following business:

The mayor asked that the citizens committee be granted four members on the paving committee instead of three and the request was granted.

Miscellaneous claims and pay rolls amounting to \$1,677.34 were ordered paid.

The sum of \$50 was appropriated to the new military band to aid them in their organization.

The committee on fire reported that they had purchased a new horse for the fire department from Walter Bingham.

The result was the same as announced in the "News" the day following the election; and the winning candidates were declared elected. The recorder was instructed to issue certificates of election.

A number of claims were allowed and the council adjourned for one week.

#### DROUTH STILL PREVAILS.

Crops are Light—Death of Mrs. Sarah Edwards.

Paragonah, Iron Co., Nov. 8.—The drouth still prevails here. The range is over-fed and the cattle interest is rather discouraging. About one-half the time crop of grain and about the same amount of hay was produced.

The recorder reported that he had received \$28.50 from Boxelder county, for boarding prisoners.

Interest of \$5,512.25 was ordered paid.

Steeper Supervisor Joe Sanders reported the street expenditures for the past quarter to have been \$2,143.26, in addition to \$1,758.70 paid for water.

The water supply expenditures had been \$489.26, including the purchase of three new sprinklers. Ordered filed.

He also reported \$7.50 received for sale for two old wheel scrapers and \$3.50 received for sale of gravel. Filed.

Police Tax Collector Harris reported \$405 collected in poll taxes. Ordered filed.

Foundkeeper A. Peterson reported ten head impounded, all of which had been disposed of, and \$8 disposed with the treasurer.

Geo. Treasurer desired to lease block 4, plat C, for five years for farming purposes. Referred to the committee on public buildings and grounds.

Strong's Canyon Water company presented a claim of \$119.87 for construction of a dam, etc., referred back to the company to explain by what authority from the city such a bill was contracted.

H. H. Goddard for the Armour Packing company from Chicago asked for the right of way for a railway switch across Wall Ave. Referred to the committee on streets with power to act.

A resolution instructing the recorder to certify the assistant counsel for Ogden city to render an account for their services to date was introduced by Mr. Jones and adopted.

The entry of advertising ordinance passed at third reading and was ordered published in the Tribune after a number of motions to publish it in the Utah State Journal, Standard and Salt Lake Herald. A committee of three was appointed to investigate a complaint against Police Officer Burk.

Two hundred dollars was appropriated to the mayor's contingent fund after which the council adjourned.
