THE MORMON METROPOLIS.—The following sketch of Salt Lake City, is furnished by an Eastern paper by the celebrated traveler and lecturer, Mr. Bayard Taylor: "Meanwhile, we must admit that Salt Lake City is one of the most quiet, orderly and moral places in the world. There are a few gentle liquor saloons; but the Mormons, as a people, are the most temperate of Americans. They are chaste, laborious and generally cheerful; and what they have accomplished in twenty-three years, under every circumstance of discouragement, will always form one of the most remarkable chapters in our history. The Territory does not owe a dollar, the people have established manufactories, built roads and bridges, irrigated wastes of sage-brush, colonized the wastes of the interior desert for an extent of four hundred miles, and made a nucleus of permanent civilization in the most forbidding part of the continent. We need only wait a little longer, until they have outgrown the narrowing effects of their long isolation and the problem of their relation to the government will solve itself."
