

NEWS ITEMS.

THE St. Louis *Democrat* says that a merchant left that city on Tuesday, commissioned by a half dozen firms to visit the markets of Great Britain, make purchases of bi-carbonate of soda, sal-soda, soda ash, caustic soda, Scotch pig iron and Liverpool salt, and charter a vessel to bring the same to New Orleans. Arrangements have been made for one of the steamers of the Atlantic and Mississippi Steamship line to receive the load of the vessel without its discharge upon the wharf of New Orleans. It is estimated that the cost of freight from Liverpool to St. Louis will not be greater than the cost from New York to St. Louis.

THE Knoxville, Tenn. *Whig*, of Sep. 25, says: "The avenging angel is walking among the mountains of East Tennessee. The Union men who were persecuted by the rebels in 1862 and 1863 are turning on their oppressors, who now come back to their homes. Old rebels and young ones, who took a leading part in hunting down the loyalists, imprisoning, starving or murdering them, have been spotted, and in defiance of 'amnesty,' are being held fearfully responsible for their crimes. Some of the most prominent are being killed every week. Cox, a malignant rebel and spy for Longstreet, was shot in Knoxville the other day by a young man whose father had been one of the victims."

THE once staid, puritanical old town of Plymouth, Mass., the scene of the earliest struggles of the Pilgrim fathers, seems to have fallen in evil days, if we may credit its town officials, who, in a recent appeal to the citizens, represent the growing population, both male and female, as alarmingly immoral, and threaten a special police for the suppression of the nightly "scenes and sounds of outrageous and disgraceful vulgarity" witnessed upon its thoroughfares.

THE CHICAGO LAKE TUNNEL.—The workmen were yesterday engaged in loading on a scow three of the seven iron cylinders to be used in the lake shaft of the great tunnel. They will probably be towed out to their destination to-day, and the others loaded. Should the weather be fine, the work of sinking the cylinders will be commenced within three or four days. The fourth chamber is now being put in the tunnel at a distance from the shore of 3,850 feet.—[*Chicago Tribune*, Sep. 20.]

A NEW Bedford paper says: "We may somewhat increase our whaling business; but we shall never again see as large an amount of tonnage employed in it as in 1856. The business will flourish; but it cannot give employment to our capital, nor employment to our labor. It certainly cannot support, and will never create, any increase of population."

THE Dover (N. H.) *Morning Star*, the organ of the Freewill Baptists, gives some statistics respecting its membership. In 1844, when their number was largest, the membership was 61,372. In 1853 it had fallen off to 48,930. In 1860 it had increased to 59,791, and now it is 55,676.

EXTENSIVE fires are raging in the woods in Massachusetts. Near Attleboro', the flames swept over a valuable tract of woodland several miles in extent, mostly covered with oak and maple. Not less than one thousand acres have suffered more or less damage.

LYNN, Mass., did a larger business in shoes last month than during any previous month of its history, making \$1,200,000 worth of boots and shoes.

THE East river oystermen have a sensation. They are in a great state of excitement. A new bivalvular El Dorado has been discovered at the bottom of the Sound, and all the oystermen hereabouts are on their way thither as fast as Boreas sees fit to blow them.

This bed of oysters is located two or three miles from the shore, and is nearly opposite Shippan Point, in the town of Stamford, Connecticut. It is reported to exceed in extent the bed which was discovered opposite Norwalk in 1860.

The oysters are of most excellent quality, most of them of the proper age and growth to make them fit for immediate use. The excitement growing out of the discovery is very great among the people who live in the villages along the coast. Many persons are leaving their regular occupations to devote their labor to gathering the shell-fish, and scarcely anything else is talked about but the new oyster bed.—[*N. Y. World*.]

Great Salt Lake City, Oct. 13, 1865.

SPECIAL ORDERS, No. 1.

I.—A general muster, for the purposes of drill, inspection of arms, and camp duty, of all the forces comprising Great Salt Lake Military District, is hereby ordered to be held, commencing at 11 o'clock a.m., on the first day of November next.

II.—The various corps will assemble under the direction of their respective commanders at the usual parade grounds in said district, armed and equipped as the law directs, and proceed to the camping grounds selected for the purpose, some three miles below the city, near the residence of Chas. Spencer, Esq., so as to arrive there at the time above specified.

III.—Each corps will provide themselves with four days' rations, camp equipage, including tents, and forage and transportation suitable and necessary for this duty.

IV.—Commanding Officers will see that all persons liable to military duty are duly notified, and that delinquents are reported, that they may be dealt with as the law directs.

V.—The resignation of Major-General George D. Grant is hereby accepted. The vacancy thus occurring will be filled by election of the forces present during the muster, and be held under the direction of the Adjutant General, who will assume command of the Division during the interim.

VI.—No spirituous liquors or beer will be allowed on the camping grounds, and sobriety, decorum and good order are strictly enjoined, and all are cautioned against carelessness in the use of fire arms, running of horses or neglect of any kind, that no accident may occur to mar the peace or enjoyment of any.

VII.—"A well regulated militia being necessary to the security of a Free people," the Lieutenant-General hopes that those who have not done so, will at once enrol themselves in some organization, and obtain and keep the necessary arms and equipments; and that all will avail themselves of the opportunity of responding to this call, as worthy citizens of our common country.
