Alleged Indian War .-- The following is an alleged extract of a letter said to have been written by a gentleman at Clinton, Utah, to Governor

Murray: "I take the liberty of writing you on a subject which I think of great im-portance. A few days ago I learned from one of our Indian friends that a scheme is on foot to bring about an In-dian war. The indian told me that Sitting Bull, a Sloux chief, had sent some of his Indians to visit the Utaha, isome of his Indians to visit the Utaha, isome of his Indians to join them in a war on the whites. I was also in-formed by the same Indian that Sitting Bull has sent agents to all the Indian tribes, with a view of forming a great union of all the tribes on the conti-nent and exterminate the whites. An Indian called 'Tom'' came over to this place, (Thistle Valley), to see the Utahs that live here and get their ideas in regard to joining Sitting Bull. Tom told one of our citizens that the Utahs are intending to have a meeting of the tribe leaders when the matter would be discussed. Tom is one of those Indians located on the Uintah Reser-vation. I give you the foregoing infor-mation because I feel it is my duty as a loyal citizen to do so. You will have the kindness to keep my name a secret for fear the Indians find it out and do me an injury."
