Section 2 provides for election on the first Monday in April, every four years, beginning this year, of one water commissioner from each of the five city wards, pending the election, the mayor is empowered to appoint a provisional water commission. The commissioners are required to furnish bonds in the sum to be fixed by the city council. The president of the commission is to be allowed a salary of \$1,000 per annum and other members salaries of \$100 a

year each. Section 3 defines the duties of the clerk, who will be required to furnish bonds, and whose salary is to be fixed

Section 4 requires the board to be incorporated: gives the board power to make water pipe extensions, and to em-ploy all necessary clerks, superintend-ents, attorneys, and employes. The board shal control all funds collected, the latter to be in the custody of the city treasurer. The board may loan

the funds upon approved security.
Section 5 provides that after the
payment of interest al revenue may
be expended for maintenance and addition to the system, and also authorizes the levying of a tax by the city council to make up a deficiency should the revenue prove insufficient. Section 6 authorizes the board

issue bonds after having submitted the proposition to a vote of registered oters who pay a property tax. Section 7 provides for the auditing of the commission's accounts by the city auditor.
