A DANGEROUS PRACTISE. Giant Powder and Caps Found Stored

Away in a Barn.

INSURANCE FIGURES. Business Here and Elsewhere During The Year 1902.

The Insurance Press, published at New York, in summing up life insurance payments in 9,333 cities and towns in 1902, estimates the total distribution to policy holders and their beneficiaries at something in excess of \$320,000,000. Of this amount \$461,975 was paid in Utah and \$226,487 in Idaho, the former being \$100,000 in excess of the payments of the previous year and the latter be-ing practically unchanged. In the esated amounts of life insurance in ce in leading citics, Salt Lake is dited with \$25,000,000, while in the list credited with \$25,000,000, while in the first of leading cities in life insurance pay-ments in 1902, the amount paid here is estimated at \$283,151, other Utah pay-ments being distributed as follows:
