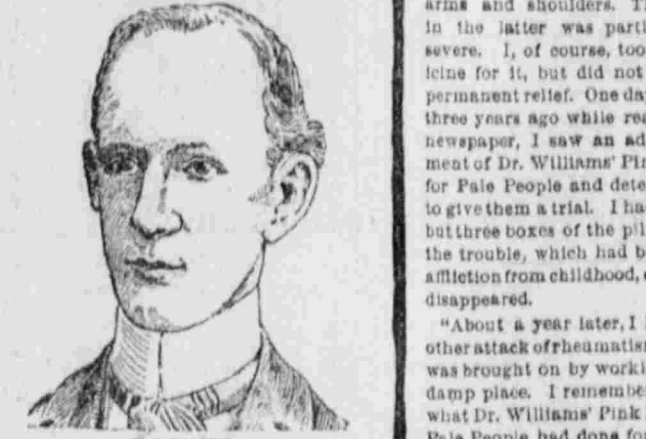
SCHOOL ENTERTAINMENT.
