LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

WEATHER. TEM. - The thermometer
stands at 75 in the shade, at noon, to-day.

tion of Utah was included in the field of
that learned gentleman's operations, and
the report is gotten up in a very complete
and able manner.

In conversation with a member of the
General Committee on the celebration of
the 4th of July, we learned some interest-

other portions of the house. Sister Openshaw
and the children, with the exception of
the daughter already mentioned, had retired,
but were aroused as soon as the fire started,
and got out without any of them being in-
jured. A number of persons were called in
the neighborhood, in which they were tolerably
successful, most of the best articles being
of adobe and partly of logs. Nothing re-
mains of it now but a portion of the adobe
walls.

The party from Beaver in search of
O'Connell's body, the man murdered in the
mountains east of Beaver, arrived here
last night. This morning they captured the
supposed murderer, a Pahvant Indian,
named "Chick," whose acquaintance was made
in his having committed the deed. On
searching Chick's camp about a mile from
here, three horses, saddles, blankets, pro-
visions, etc., also a bunch consisting of six
horses and twenty-five cents and a finger
ring, belonging to O'Connell, were found,
which the Indians delivered to the Captain
of the party. The Indian has been taken to
Beaver to have his trial according to law.

June 23.
According to a report received this morn-
ing, the Indian who murdered O'Connell
and captured yesterday, made his
escape from the party after killing him, and
in the place where the body was left. It
is supposed he came here during last night,
and after conversing with some persons
living near here, he sought his horses,
which were left in the pasture, and started
early this morning. Immediately on in-
formation being given of the fact that the
murderer had escaped, the party started in
pursuit, but being prevented until near five
o'clock, they failed to get him. He is still
running at large.
