

SECRET SERVICE MAN WAS KILLED

Two Stories Told of How Jos.
Walker Met Death at the
Hesperus Mine.

SAID TO HAVE FIRED FIRST.

Miners Trespassing Shot in Return
And Claim It Was in Self
Defense.

Denver, Nov. 3.—Word reached here tonight that Joseph Walker, a United States secret service man, was shot and instantly killed today by an employee of the Hesperus mine, located several miles west of Durango, Colo. The shooting occurred at the mouth of the air shaft of the mine and is said to have been done in self-defense. The Hesperus mine is owned by the Porter Fuel company, and C. C. Doherty, attorney for the company, was notified of the killing tonight. His report of the affair, which he says is trustworthy, clearly justifies the shooting. It seems that government agents have been in the Durango country for several days gathering evidence to be used in prosecuting persons charged for fraudulent entries on coal lands.

This being Sunday no work was in progress in the Hesperus mine and several of the miners were strolling over the company property and on approaching the air shaft, located from the west of the workings, a man who was standing at the mouth of the shaft ordered them to halt. The miners thought he was joking and did not obey, whereupon, according to Doherty's story, the man fired, the bullet passing close to the head of one of the miners. The latter whipped out a revolver and returned the fire, killing the man instantly. Investigation developed that he was Joseph Walker.

Further investigation showed that a rope ladder had been let down into the mine and this was hauled to the surface. Some time afterward three men, all government agents, approached at the mine entrance, being unable to make exit any other way. Doherty says there was no reason for the secret service men entering the Hesperus mine, as the title to the property is not questioned and their act was simple trespass.

The three men who were down in the mine were John Chapman, a government geologist; T. J. Callahan, special agent; and Thomas Harper of Pagosa Springs, Colo., an expert on coal veins. Tompkins, a miner, who is a witness at the Durango county trial, told the Denver branch of the department of justice of the federal government, received a report of the affair from his men at Durango, but is withholding the contents from the public. He is said, however, that he would not be willing to accept the claim that Walker was wholly to blame for the shooting.

Wheeler said that Walker had been in the government service for ten years and while he always was armed, he never had had to use a weapon. He also said that Wheeler had been in the Durango country for 10 months on government business and was well known to everybody, particularly the people around the coal mines. Furthermore, Vanderwey was a witness at the grand jury hearing in this city and must have seen and known Walker, who was also around headquarters here constantly. The claim that they thought Walker a stranger, therefore, was not tenable. Both Mason and Vanderwey were placed under arrest. A coroner's inquest will be held on the body of Walker tomorrow.

Late tonight a telephone message from Durango contained information based on the authority of Thomas Harper entirely at variance with the statement coming from the Hesperus people. Harper was the first to communicate with Durango authorities, going several miles to reach a telephone. He stated that he and two companions who went into the mine did not learn of the killing of Walker until they came out through the mouth of the tunnel, but that instead they had returned to the surface by means of the rope ladder by which they had descended into the mine. Harper also stated that four bullet wounds were found in Walker's body.

At the jail tonight Mason is said to have told that Walker fired two shots at him and had been killed by Vanderwey in defense of Mason. Harper claims that Walker's revolver shows but one cartridge discharged and that this was expended in shooting at a mark yesterday. Harper further stated, according to the dispatch, that the Hesperus people were notified on Friday that on that day the mine would be inspected by government agents for the purpose of ascertaining whether or not the boundary lines of the company's property had been reached. On going in the direction of the mine on that day the story continues, the federal agents were followed and abandoned their plan until today.

KAISER WILL PAY VISIT TO ENGLAND

Series of Most Elaborate Entertainments Being Arranged
For His Majesty.

BANQUET WILL BE AN EVENT.
To Surpass in Splendor Anything Ever
Before Attempted in the United
Kingdom.

London, Nov. 3.—England is to be invaded by royalty during November. The German emperor and empress, who, it is said, will be accompanied by the imperial chancellor, Prince von Bismarck, and to whose visit some political significance is attached, will arrive here on Nov. 11 and will spend a week as guests of King Edward and Queen Alexandra at Windsor castle, which has been considerably altered and improved for their reception. A staff of several hundred workmen are busy in and around the historic residence home of the British sovereign, and have already greatly altered the appearance of the grounds and buildings.

A series of most elaborate entertainments has been arranged, including theatrical performances, and a great state banquet at which the German emperor will meet many of the leaders of Great Britain's political and social world. The banquet, if plans do not materially change, will be given on the night of the king before attempted here, for in this as in all other respects King Edward is desirous of showing the greatest honor to his nephew. In the hope of forging another link in the chain which is to draw the two countries closer together.

The days will be spent by the emperor and his other guests in the hunting in Windsor's great park, but the royal visitors will have to spare one day from sport to pay a visit of state to the city of London and be entertained by the lord mayor at luncheon.

This visit to the city is the cause of some apprehension, for a section of the press has been endeavoring to represent the intention of making hostile demonstrations along the line of the procession, but the police have been forewarned. The general public may, however, be relied upon to give the grand welcome of Queen Victoria a hearty welcome. The anarchists are never active in England, but to make it doubly sure, the so-called "red" party in the refuge in England, is being closely watched by English and foreign detectives, and the whereabouts of all dangerous persons is already known to Scotland Yard and their movements will be followed.

Other royal visitors are coming before the German sovereigns, but will remain longer, so that at least one of the great entertainments at Windsor castle will shelter no fewer than four ruling European monarchs—the German emperor and the kings of England, Spain and Norway. The kings of Spain and Norway, with their consorts and their infant heirs to their respective thrones, are coming on official business, but with all the members of the royal family will go to Sandringham for the celebration of the king's birthday, Nov. 6.

Another event of the month that will bring together many royalties is the wedding of Don Carlos of Spain and Princess Louise of Orleans, which will take place at Wood Norton, the English home of the Duke of Orleans, the head of the Bourbon-Orleans family. The king and queen of Spain, the queen of Portugal and the Duke and Duchess of Anjou, will all be present at the ceremony and reception, for which elaborate arrangements are being made. The church on the family estate is being enlarged and renovated, and all the country houses in the neighborhood are in the hands of decorators.

Kansas City, Nov. 3.—Seven counties and towns in Missouri are about to vote on local option as follows: Nov. 3, Nevada, in Vernon county; Nov. 5, Moyette county; Nov. 5, Pulaski county; Nov. 11, Aurora, Lawrence county; Nov. 15, Davies county; Nov. 15, Caldwell county; Nov. 25, Jackson county.

Outside of Kansas City and Independence, 31 of the 114 counties in the state have already voted on the issue.

About 25 counties, cities and towns are to hold elections before Dec. 31, and the Anti-Saloon League of Missouri expects a large number of these decisions at least will be won by the "dry."

MONTANA LABOR UNION.
Subordinate Organizations Withdraw-
ing Because of Arbitrariness.

Helena, Mont., Nov. 3.—As a result of the Helenscott campaign, which has been waged for several months by the Montana Federation of Labor against business houses and individuals patronizing the Rocky Mountain Bell Telephone company, four of the strongest labor unions in Helena have withdrawn from the state organization, Helena Typographical union No. 95 today decided to divorce itself from the organization.

Howard O. Smith, secretary of the federation, is a member of the typographical union, and the action of the printers today takes away his membership in the state body. Smith, with Alexander Fairgreive, president of the federation, was recently enjoined by the federal court from continuing their alleged boycott tactics, and since then the cooks and waiters, the bartenders and the teamsters have withdrawn from the organization, which now is threatened with disintegration.

GOLDFIELD'S OUTPUT.
Goldfield, Nev., Nov. 2.—The output of mines and leases of Goldfield district for the week ending last night was 3,731 tons, having an estimated value of \$145,000. While this is a considerable falling off from the week previous, it was expected in the face of existing conditions.

AIRSHIP CO. INCORPORATED.

Is the Bayonne Aerial Navigation
Company. Capital \$100,000.

New York, Nov. 2.—The incorporation of another airship company is reported in New York. Hyman Laxer, William Shubert and Julius W. De Chirco, the last named a United States with a bent toward aviation, have incorporated the Bayonne Aerial Navigation company. Bayonne is a suburb of New York City.

The company is capitalized at \$100,000 and will begin turning out airships next February, possibly in or near Bayonne, if its plans carry. According to specifications filed prior to incorporation the airships are to be propelled by wings measuring 24 feet from tip to tip. A 24 horsepower gas engine will supply the power and the whole contrivance is to weigh 250 pounds. Mr. De Chirco is the inventor of the machine.

**CROWN PRINCE FREDRICK
DEVOTED TO HIS WORK.**

Berlin, Nov. 3.—Crown Prince Frederick William is devoting himself with much zeal to his new work in the ministry of the interior. He lives in Potsdam, about 18 miles from his office, and to get there by 9 o'clock he must arise before 7 every morning. He comes in an automobile, and so far has been punctual. He occupies a desk exactly like those of the crown clerks, or for the jurisdiction of Privy Councillor von Falkenhayn, who is the guide of the crown prince in learning how the interior administration of Prussia is handled.

The crown prince sees the mail to the ministry opened and distributed in the backs of the various bureaus, or for forwarded to other ministries. He has the privilege of taking the papers on any subject that interests him to his own desk to study. During the past week he has given his attention especially to a project concerning the breeding of army horses, which has been passed from the interior to the agricultural department. The crown prince went to the ministry of agriculture and interviewed the authorities on horse breeding there, and he attended a meeting of horse breeders to hear the subject discussed by practical men.

He remains at the ministry of the interior until between 12 and 1 o'clock every day, and takes home such papers as he wishes, often working evenings on the reports. This month the crown prince will attend, in addition to his work at the ministry, a course of lectures at the Berlin university.

The crown prince has grown suddenly popular with the people, for to him is attributed the overthrow of the so-called Eulenburg camarilla at court.

A DOUBLE MURDER.

Rafael Ruffano and His Wife Victims
Of an Assassin.

Phoenix, N. J., Nov. 2.—Rafael Ruffano and his wife, Antonietta, were murdered at Garfield, N. J., last night. Early today a neighbor found the woman's body on the walk in front of the grocery store which the couple owned. In the kitchen back of the store, Ruffano's body was found lying on the floor. Both had been shot in the head. Ruffano had evidently been killed instantly, but a trail of blood showed where his wife had crawled through the store and to the walk. There is no clue to the murderer. The doors and windows at the back of the house were locked and the front door of the store was open.

Ruffano and his wife moved to Garfield from New York, where they had conducted a grocery store in Harlem. To requite them they said they had been compelled to leave Italy suddenly two years ago, but gave no reason for their hasty departure. Mrs. Ruffano seemed always in fear of something, and was constantly watchful and alert. She always carried a revolver in her pocket, where it was found, fully loaded, today.
