

# JOCKEY ACCUSED OF THROWING RACE

McLaughlin Suspended from  
State Fair Ass'n Track Pend-  
ing An Investigation.

SEEN TO PULL HIS MOUNT IN

Makes a Big Bluff on Home Stretch  
But Fails to Land Semporella  
Ahead of Minnie.

"There is nothing a dishonest jockey does not deserve," says Judge Blum, and nothing which looks crooked passes by Judge Blum of the fair grounds race meet. Jockey McLaughlin learned that it is bad business to do anything which doesn't look right, for McLaughlin was suspended until further notice because he pulled Semporella back when that animal was a sure winner. His mount was away at the word "go" and soon led the field by two lengths. Semporella was running strong, and there was nothing to it but Semporella who had been played heavily. But on the turn McLaughlin was seen to sit up and pull back. Minnie came out of the bunch and went ahead. In the stretch McLaughlin made a big bluff of trying to force his mount to the front, but Minnie and the race by a length. Immediately after the finish, the suspected jockey was called over to the judges' stand to explain matters, and failing to satisfy the judges that all had been O. K., was told to stay out of races until notified. The affair is being investigated further.

CHICAGO BOMB THROWER IS AT WORK AGAIN

Chicago, Oct. 21.—The bomb thrower who has attempted to worry Chicago gamblers for more than a year, kept up his activity last night by setting off one of the explosives in the basement just beneath the entrance of a saloon at Central street and Sheffield avenue, in which Monte Tennes is said to be interested.

This bomb—No. 22—is the third hurled in as many nights. On Sunday night the saloon of James O'Leary was partially wrecked, and Monday night the saloon of former John C. Rogers, was visited by the bomb thrower.

The explosion last night shattered the two large plate glass windows in the front of the saloon.

Several persons in the saloon at the time and two families in the room above the place, received a severe shaking up, while the bartender was thrown to the floor.

This is the second time this place has been visited by explosions. Bombs were also hurled here set off twice at the home of Monte Tennes.

JUDGE SYMPATHIZED WITH THE HYENA

New York, Oct. 21.—The suit of Miss Anna Richardson against Frank C. Bostock for \$15,000 damages for the loss of a finger of the right hand, has been dismissed by Judge McLean in the supreme court in Brooklyn.

It was back in the summer of 1909 while the plaintiff was a visitor at the Bostock wild beast show at Coney Island, that the mishap befell her, a hyena, since dead, having seized her hand as she was pushed against the cage. The incident, said that the hyena's teeth had been closed on her hand, and that the mishap had been permitted, but people need not go to see them.

"There is nothing here to show," he said, "that any negligence existed on the part of the defendant. I think it cruel to look upon caged wild animals. I shall dismiss the complaint. I am sorry the plaintiff was injured, but my sympathy is with the hyena."

FIRE IN DENVER.

Hungarian Mills Elevator Destroyed Early This Morning.

Denver, Oct. 21.—Fire, evidently of incendiary origin, destroyed the elevator of the Hungarian Mills company at an early hour this morning, causing a loss of \$450,000. In the elevator was stored 400,000 bushels of wheat, which was consumed. About 10 o'clock the police officer on the beat noticed two men loitering in the neighborhood of the elevator, and when he approached they started to run. The officer gave chase, but the men disappeared in the darkness. When he returned the elevator was in flames from fires that had been started at several places. An alarm was turned in, but the fire department was unable to check the flames, which had practically doomed the building before their arrival. The miller, however, was not hurt, and at a time, but by heroic efforts were saved with slight damage.

HONORE JOSEPH JAXON.

He is Now a Candidate for Member Of Canadian Parliament.

Chicago, Oct. 21.—A dispatch to the Record-Herald from Winnipeg says: Honore Joseph Jaxon, who was prominent in the United States last year because of his correspondence with President Roosevelt upon the Haywood-Moyer-Pettibone "undesirable citizen" question, has caused much commotion in the country west of Winnipeg by appearing as a candidate for the Ottawa parliament. He came to the northwest several months ago and has been put forward as the candidate of an independent element that has arisen among the farmers and workmen and seems to have strength. In his appeal to the voters Jaxon attacks both leading political parties and puts forth a statement which strikes radically at Canadian claims to govern the northwest.

Dr. Jaxon's candidacy probably will bring up the question whether he is a Canadian or belongs under the United States flag by birth. He claimed, when living in Chicago, to have been born in Jaxon's Buffalo camp between Mon-
