HOW A TEACHER SAVED HER PUPILS FROM FLAMES

Bay City, Mich., Oct, 21.- A special o the Tribune from Alpena, Mich., ays:

says: Among the most thrilling experiences of survivors of the Presque Isle coun-ty forest fires, was that of Miss Grace Barber, a school teacher, 19 years old, whose school in Krakow township was Iree Indians,

whose school in Krakow township was in session when the flames swept down upon the building Thursday. A terri-fied farmer had rushed into the build-ing to give the alarm just as the rear of the schoolhouse caught fire. The teacher marshalled her pupils in a double row, the largest at the head, and ordered them to remain in close order and not to break the line. She then directed the leaders to head for a plowed field nearby and the column started on a run. Miss Barber bringing up the rear to prevent straggling. Burning embers fell thick, but the teacher kept the children close together and every ember was extinguished the instant it fell upon any child's cloth-ing. Soon animals began to appear upo nthe edge of the field and during the night two bears made their appearance. A fox came slinking in, as did a bob cat, rabbits, partridges and other game. But the animals kept well away from the chil-dren, not even the bears offering hos-tile demonstrations. Miss Barber kept her charges in the field all Thursday night and in the morning sent them home in groups, riloting the smaller ones herself.

FIRE IN DENVER.

Hungarian Mills Elevator Destroyed Early This Morning.

Denver, Oct. 21 .- Fire, evidently of

Denver, Oct. 21.—Fire, evidently of incendiary origin, desuroyed the ele-vator of the Hungarian Mills company at an early hour this morning, causing a loss of \$450,000. In the elevator was stored 400,000 bushels of wheat, which was consumed. About 1 o'clock the police officer on the beat noticed two men leitering in the neighborhood of the elevator, and when he approached they started to run. The officer gave chase, but the men disappeared in the darkness. When he returned the ele-vator was in flames from fires that had been started at several places. An

An alarm was turned in, but the fire de-partment was unable to check the flames, which had practically doomed the building before their arrival. The mills proper were threatened for a time, but by heroic efforts were saved with slight damage.
