

JAPAN HAS GOBBLED KOREA.

Emperor Was Opposed to Protectorate But He Was Powerless.

MONEY WAS FREELY USED.

Substantial Sums Presented to Those Ministers Who Consented to Japanese Demands.

Seoul, Nov. 18.—(Delayed in transmission)—The conference of nearly a week between the Japanese envoys headed by Marquis Ito, and the Korean cabinet, ended yesterday, and was followed early this morning by a nine-hour sitting with the emperor.

At the beginning of today's session Baron Hayashi declared his determination not to withdraw until the four demands made by Marquis Ito were signed. The emperor was crowned at 1:30 o'clock this morning when the cabinet, with the exception of the minister of agriculture and minister of foreign affairs, Pakichun, having yielded, sent for the imperial seal and signed the desired agreement. The four Japanese demands were as follows:

First—The appointment of a Japanese administrator to govern Korea under the emperor.

Second—The appointment of Japanese administrators at all treaty ports.

Third—The transfer of Korean diplomatic affairs to Tokyo.

Fourth—No arrangements to be made with powers without the consent of Japan.

Three thousand Japanese soldiers maintained a demonstration all yesterday on the esplanade before the old palace. Japanese troops patrolled the streets all night. The emperor's palace was also surrounded with troops and Japanese soldiers and police were lodged in the grounds of the palace.

Minister Pakichun and the minister of agriculture continue to hold out with the emperor against the action of the Japanese.

Minister Pakichun, in leading the opposition against the signing of the demands of Marquis Ito, advised the emperor with the most powerful argument possible to a superstitious, benighted sovereign namely, that his consent would affront and outrage all the spirits of his imperial ancestors.

The conference between Baron Hayashi and the Korean cabinet, which led to an agreement, began yesterday morning at the Japanese legation and was so violent as to attract attention on adjacent streets. It resulted in Pakichun and the minister of agriculture dramatically denouncing the proceedings and withdrawing to the palace, where they secluded themselves with the emperor.

The emperor then ordered that the ministers who consented to the Japanese demands be assassinated. After the signatures and seals were attached to the Japanese military paraded through the city.

Baron Hayashi after securing the consent of the majority of the cabinet, went from the legation to the palace, where he attempted to get the remaining ministers of the justice of his mission, but failed. He then secured the seals through the other ministers.

The emperor took alarm at the contents and tone of Marquis Ito's credentials when they were presented to him on the 10th inst. The day after the arrival of the marquis, his alarm increased because the Japanese sought to have the marquis occupy the emperor's audience chambers and there receive a return visit to the palace, who resented, fighting sickness.

It required five days to arrange an interview regarding the mission of Marquis Ito, and then a conference was held at which the emperor referred the entire matter to his cabinet.

It is stated among diplomats that the Korean ministry has steadily managed this difficult situation in subverting Korean sovereignty, which was an inevitable sequel to the proposals of February and September, 1904.

It is said that through entreaty by treaty to a dignified appeal to the good offices of American and other powers, to assist in the rectification of alleged Japanese injustices, the ministers preferred fruitless undertakings.

It is said that at the present moment the throne has three secret agents abroad for the purpose of curbing intervention. One of them is in China, the second is Yikongki, who is in France, and Mr. Hurlbut is now in America with \$4,000 funds.

A conflict between civil and military authorities is now expected and Minister Hayashi has already sent a strong circular to the Japanese consuls in Korea to administer justice impartially.

After the presentation of the nikaka's gifts to the court, it is reported that substantial sums of money were used for the purpose of satisfying the ministers who consented to the Japanese demands. About 30,000 Japanese soldiers, billeted on the people, or in barracks, are at the service of the Japanese, but no disturbances are expected.

Foreign officials took no part in the above events, though last midnight, when an alarm was sounded, and the Japanese might use force, it was believed that the American legation adjoining the palace, might become a temporary refuge for the Korean cabinet and cabinet are still closely guarded and protected.

ALL RESTS WITH KOREA.

London, Nov. 19.—The Tokyo correspondent of the Standard says that under the agreement by which Japan is to exercise suzerainty over Korea she

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will take charge of all the foreign relations of the Hermit kingdom until the latter is strong enough to maintain her independence, and that the internal administration of Korea has been confided to a Japanese governor-general, who will act under the orders of the emperor of Korea.

The Tokyo correspondent of the Daily Telegraph in giving similar information adds that Marquis Ito assured the Korean emperor that the convention was only in a measure a demand on the part of Korea, and that it rested with that country itself to advance to such an extent as to insure it against any attack which would menace the safety of Japan.

A MOST REMARKABLE BURIAL.

Men's Remains Incinerated in Great Steel Ingot Which Was Buried.

Philadelphia, Nov. 19.—At Midvale today a 40-ton steel ingot, permeated with the blood and bones of two workmen, was buried with the solemn rites of the Roman Catholic church. The workmen, who were so strangely laid away were John Finkin and Joseph Gazda, two foreign-speaking laborers, who met a horrible death a week ago. They were in a pit near a cupola containing many tons of molten metal. A plug gave way and 50,000 pounds of the molten metal poured from the cupola and completely incinerated them. The men were themselves or their clothing was left. The Midvale Steel company was averse to selling the steel or using it, and it was decided to bury it with the rites of the church to which the unfortunate men had belonged. Accordingly the 40-ton ingot, oval in shape, 28 feet long, 6 feet wide and 5 feet thick, was moved last week by a traveling crane to the rear of the machine shop, where a grave 10 feet deep had been made. The great mass of steel was laid in the hole and a platform was built over it so that the burial services could be properly performed. In the center of the platform was an opening six feet in diameter.

A great crowd sought admission to the service today, but only the two sisters of Gazda, who depended upon him for support, and about 100 workmen, who were on Sunday duty were permitted to attend the services, along with the officials of the company. Finkin had no relatives in this country. Among the officials was President Charles Harrah. All heads were bared and flags were lowered to half mast while two priests conducted the services.

After the sisters of Gazda had been laid away the great ingot was covered with earth and the funeral party dispersed. The grave of the men will be appropriately marked by the company.

OUTRAGES ON JEWS.

Meeting Held in Denver to Protest Against Them.

Denver, Nov. 19.—A well attended meeting called by the pastors of the Christian churches of the city was held today at the First Baptist church. A voice protest against the outrages on Jews in Russia, Chief Justice Gabbert, of the supreme court, presided. Resolutions were adopted and a fund for relief was started. A delegation from the Woman's club volunteered the club's assistance in raising money through the medium of entertainments, etc.

SAFE BLOWER ESCAPES.

Marysville, Cal., Nov. 19.—William A. Spout, accused of blowing the vault of the Yuba City bank 19 days ago, escaped from the county jail today and has not been recaptured.

Spout was allowed the freedom of the entire jail, there being no other prisoners. He was there for breakfast, but at dinner time the jail was empty, and broken skylights above the steel bars showed the means of his exit. He had climbed on to the top of the cages and used a fire shovel to loosen bricks enough to remove the steel bars, when he climbed to the roof and slid down the drain pipes and disappeared.

Spout has served five terms in different state prisons for his services. The officers among them Commers. When arrested at Sacramento one week ago he was planning to rob a Japanese bank in that city. He had confessed to the shooting of William A. San Francisco, confessed the Yuba City crime and several others, after the arrest, and an outfit of safe-cracking appliances was recovered.

Shepard Wilson has been securing the country.

DELEGATES VISIT SMELTER.

El Paso, Tex., Nov. 19.—Delegates to the American Mining congress, which has been in session at El Paso, today visited the Copper Queen smelter at Douglas, Ariz. Luncheon was served in the sampling racks at the smelter. A special train for Douglas left El Paso early this morning, returning before midnight. The delegates will leave for their homes tomorrow.

RUSSIA THREATENS TURKEY.

London, Nov. 19.—The Sofia correspondent of the Times says that the disregard by the Turkish government of Russia's oft-repeated protests against the strengthening by Turkey of her fortifications in the Bosphorus and the Black sea littoral, has resulted in a demand by Russia for the immediate payment of the arrears of the Russo-Turkish loan. Russia threatens to take the case in the event of non-payment occupation of a point on the Turkish coast.

MORE RIOTING AT KISHINEV.

London, Nov. 20.—The Bucharest correspondent of the Daily Chronicle reports on Saturday anti-Jewish rioting took place in Kishinev, resulting in pillage and arson, and that many persons were killed.

THIRTY-NINE MEN PERISH IN A FIRE.

Burned to Death in a Cheap Lodging House in Glasgow.

IDENTIFICATION DIFFICULT.

Habit of Inmates to go to Bed Nude. In that Condition Survivors Marched to Police Station.

Glasgow, Nov. 19.—The most terrible fire that has occurred in Great Britain for many years broke out here today in a cheap lodging-house for men in Watson street and resulted in the loss of 39 lives and the severe injury of many others.

The flames were first noticed at 6 o'clock this morning on the fourth floor of the building, which was occupied by 330 men. An alarm was raised and the firemen responded quickly, but flames and smoke were then issuing from most of the windows on the fourth floor. An extraordinary scene was created by a procession of almost naked men rushing out of the entrance to the building and against their frantic efforts to escape the firemen had actually to fight for admission.

Reaching the upper floors, the firemen found that the narrow passages were becoming congested with men who had dropped to the floor overcome by smoke. The fire, however, was confined to the fourth floor, and as soon as the firemen were able to get to work it was speedily extinguished. The flames had been fed by volumes of smoke, resulting in the suffocation of the inmates, but others had to be taken to hospitals.

The dead were mostly workmen, in the prime of life. They presented a horrible sight, their blackened faces bearing evidence of terrible struggles to escape.

Many men were sleeping in the attic floor, above the burning fourth floor, and these had narrow escapes. The flames burst through the floor and it was impossible for the men to descend. The windows were broken and the men had to break them so that they could climb through to neighboring roofs.

By 10 o'clock a search of the building was made and a complete list of the victims obtained, which showed that 39 were dead and 32 injured.

It appears to be the custom of these lodgers to sleep in a nude condition and the march of the survivors to the police station was a fantastic one. Some had snatched the covers of the beds and others their trousers, while many wore nothing. The local authorities had to be called upon to supply the men with clothing and warm meals. Owing to their migratory habits and the absence of permanent homes, many of the dead will never be identified. The identification of others is rendered difficult by the absence of clothing.

NO CLASH BETWEEN FISHERMEN.

Danger of One in Newfoundland Has Been Averted.

Washington, Nov. 19.—All danger of a clash between the Gloucester and Newfoundland fishermen has been averted, it is believed, for this season. The exchanges between Secy. Root and Sir Mortimer Durand, the British ambassador, The secretary is now awaiting the reply of the London government to his memorandum in which he called attention to the three main points of difference. This is expected some time within the week and its receipt, it is believed, will clear up practically the entire situation.

PRESENT "PRINCE OF INDIA."

Chicago, Nov. 19.—At a conference of theatrical managers here today arrangements were completed for an original presentation at the Colonial theater soon after the first of the year of a dramatization of Gen. ANGLO-TIBETAN TREATY.

London, Nov. 20.—The Tokyo correspondent of the Daily Telegraph understands that an Anglo-Tibetan treaty has been signed and that it provides that Great Britain shall acknowledge Chinese sovereignty in Tibet in return for which China will pay an indemnity.
