FOREIGN.

LONDON, 21.—The Prince of Orange is dead.

The commercial attaché of the English embassy at Paris reports that the French government is extending a system of different duties which it has decided to establish in Tonquin. By the system now to be established in all French possessions in Africa, a duty of 20 per cent. is levied upon all except French goods, and in order to favor French vessels, restrictions will be imposed upon the navigation of rivers on the west coast of Africa, which are held by the French. The French foreign office has requested the embassy at Paris to make a report on the subject.

Patrick Joyce, a native of Galway, was arrested at Queenstown, to-day, on the steamer *Illinois*. A brass tube two feet long and four inches in diameter was found in his baggage. The ends of the tube were well secured and refused to open. Joyce was remanded by the magistrates till Monday.

LONDON, 22.—Granville, through the English Ambassador to the powers, sent a circular convoking the Egyptian conference June 28th. The circular briefly repeats the terms of the dispatch of the 19th of April, suggesting a conference, and adds that the conference is called to consider what change will be necessary in the law of liquidation to restore financial order in Egypt. The circular is attributed to a design to influence Parliament by the presence of a conference during the approaching debate on a vote of censure in regard to the Egyptian policy. Before sending the circular, Granville was accused of its acceptance by France, Germany and Austria and Italy.

THE HAGUE, 22.—The Prince of Orange passed a calm night and peacefully morning before the collapse. In the forenoon of Saturday he seemed so well the doctors talked of sending him to the south of France. At 11 o'clock he suddenly exhibited symptoms of extreme weakness, fainting and his respiration became greatly enfeebled. Subsequently a slight recovery was noticeable, but the lungs seemed paralyzed. From this time until his death the Prince remained unconscious. The King has returned from Carlsbad and held a conference with the Cabinet. The President of the Council has convoked a general State Council. The Cabinet has decided to resort to the provisions of the law November 3d and 4th, and will convene the Chambers in the forenoon of Saturday in a plenary congress of 78 senators instead of 39, and 72 deputies instead of 86. This congress will proclaim the Princess Wilhelmine successor under the council to the regency, with Queen Emma as regent, and the President of the Council as chancellor. The Cabinet has determined refused to share the tutelage with any German branch of the royal family.

Berlin, 22.—Bismarck, during the illness of the Prince of Orange, caused German representatives at the various European courts to declare that any attempt to appoint a successor to the regency in Holland, would find instant opposition from Germany. This declaration is taken to mean that Germany alone has the right to meddle in the affairs of Holland. The king is ill, his death is near. On his decease, the Duke of Nassau failing to attain the throne, Holland will claim the Grand Duchy of Luxembourg.

MADRID, 23.—In Congress yesterday the West Indian members advocated the suppression of export duties and a reduction of import duties, a reduction of expenses from \$24,000,000 to \$24,000,000, and the early conclusion of a treaty of commerce with America as the only means of extricating Cuba from the economical depression now existing. The government declared it was impossible for Spain to assume the Cuban debt or annul the deficit, and that it was impossible to satisfy Cuban aspirations for better commercial relations with America, which would damage peninsular trade with the colonies. A slight reform was promised to facilitate trade between Spain and Cuba. The depression, it was declared, had been aggravated by the too rapid abolition of slavery. The reply of the government caused much discontent among the members.

LONDON, 23.—The tube found in the baggage of Patrick Joyce, who was arrested on the steamer *Illinois*, yesterday, is believed to be an infernal machine of novel and ingenious pattern. It resembled a log, but was found to be hollow, a hole having been pierced through it, leading to a chamber containing a liquid supposed to be explosive. There was an outer wooden casing, 16 inches long and 4 inches thick, within which the brass tube was encased. On removing a metal cap the liquid was found. Except by careful examination, it was impossible to suppose the article was anything but a log of wood.

The Spanish bark *Angelita*, which left New Orleans for Barcelona, was struck by lightning and burned. The crew were rescued.

Paris, 22.—The Imperial committee

have re-elected Cassagnac president, and have approved of Prince Victor's resolve to obtain his independence and declared him a representative of religious liberty and order in democracy. Vienna, 23.—Several Foreign anarchists have been arrested. In their possession was a dynamite bomb of sufficient power to blow up the largest public building in Vienna.

THE WORK OF THE LORD IN THE LAND OF THE AZTECS.

Following is an interesting excerpt from a letter by Elder Helaman Pratt, dated at the City of Mexico, May 20th, to Brother August Wilcken, of this city.

"I have visited the Saints of the Tierra Caliente twice, found them feeling well, and on our last visit, (the 27th ult., we baptized two in San Andres de la Cal. On the 12th instant, we baptized five here in the city; this makes thirty that have been baptized since our arrival a little over six months ago; we have also blessed 23 children, ordained two Elders and administered to many who have been sick. We have been greatly blessed in our administrations, the Lord hearing and answering our prayers.

He has also raised up friends on every hand, some of whom are among the best families in the land. A few of them are reading and

seem to be greatly interested in our books. Your old friend Silver-ter Lopez is very friendly and I have a good stopping place with him, where I am always welcomed by his good wife and family. He is convinced of the truth of the Gospel, but thinks it best to postpone a little while. They often speak of you. I have also formed the acquaintance of Mr. Lutz and family; we occasionally spend an evening in pleasant conversation and listening to your former pupils on the piano.

Bro. Candemosa and I returned yesterday from a visit to Ameca, Tecalco Ozumba and Chimal, where we found all well, and the interest steadily increasing. The native brethren are working faithfully for the spread of the truth. Bro. Snow is busy with his classes and is earning enough to keep up with his expenses; he is making good progress in the language. I am free to go and come as circumstances may require. I shall endeavor to keep you posted in the affairs of the mission from time to time. Bro. Snow joins in respects to yourself and wife, and also the Spanish classes; say to them that there is a big field opening to all those who can speak Spanish and have a desire to labor for the redemption of the scattered remnants of the house of Jacob."
