Disinfecting a Big Library.

It is claimed the books of a circulating library are liable, at one time or another, to become the vehicle through which infectious diseases may be disseminated. A gentleman has written upon this subject in recent years, and now it is once more revived by the statement of a prominent physician that New York public library has completed a plan for the disinfection of books used in the circulating department. Can New York be the first to do this? It is probable that every physician knows the books of a circulating library to be channels for the spreading of contagious diseases, caused by some effective sterilizing process. Doctors from New York's great library, it is noted, will run no risk, for Dr. Williams has had the books of his library sterilized.

This plan is the use of the vapor of formalin as a disinfectant, such vapor being produced by burning the same. Each book is placed in a special apparatus, in which it is returned to its place in the circulating apparatus, which consists of a double-walled box of tinplate or wood, with a glass door, and a small opening for the books, and they are exposed for the escape of the vapor. A narrow building, with a small opening at the top, a little water is added and gentle heat applied, completes the apparatus. The vapor is injected in the bottom, and the books are returned to their place in the circulating apparatus through the space between the walls.
