The Governor has taken the ground for a long time that these offices should be filled by the nomination of the Governor and the appointment of the Governor and the Council of the Legislative Assembly, under section seven of the Organic Act. But should we grant that his view of the matter is correct, it does not follow that he has the right to act in the extraordinary and arbitrary manner soul of a gentleman. which has characterized his proceedings in connection with it. He cannot compel the Council to confirm his nominstions, any more than President Cleveland can force the Senate of the United States to confirm his nominations. It takes both the Executive and the Senate in the latter case to appoint, it takes the executive and the Council to appoint in the former case.

Taking the Governor's view to be right, there is a certain amount of similarity between the two positions. But they are not by any means identical. And one great difference is, that while the President during the adjournment of the Senate, may remove officers and make appointments ad interim, the Governor cannot remove any officer, and can only fill vacancies arising from two causes, namely, the death or the resignation of an officer in whose appointment he has a voice. This is very clearly defined in Section 1858 of the of town or even on the streets of this Revised Statutes of the United States, as follows:

"In any of the Territories, whenever a encancy happens from resignation or death, during the recess of the Legislative Council, in any office which under the Organic Act of any Territory is to be filled by sppoint-ment of the Governor by and with the advice and consent of the Council, the Governor shall fill such vacancy by granting a commission, which shall ex-pire at the end of the pext session of the Legislative Council."

The question is, what vacancy exists from the death or resignation of any such officer? The answer ils, no such vacancy has occurred, therefore there is none for the Governor to fill. He cannot create a vacancy for any cause. Neither can he lawfully assume that a vacancy exists while the de facto incumbents are alive and do not resign. He has acknowledged, officially, that the present incumbents are de facto officers, although he denies that they are officers de jure. In doing so he claims that the law providing for their election is void. But he has no judicial functions. He has no authority to decide as to the validity of a law framed by the Legiscessors. In assuming to declare a law of the Territory Invalid, be usurpa judicial powers. And in attempting to fill offices in which no vacancy exists, except such as he judicially assumes to exist, he arrogates to himself extra-executive powers and thus goes beyond the bounds of official right and official decency.

Mullen gave the usual signal to hoist to the 300-foot level, which was done by the engineer, and after a pause of a couple of min-utes, the latter states, the bell was again rung, indicating that the men desired to be hoisted to the surface and they were started up. The dial of the indicator is traversed by the finger in making 900 feet up or down the shaft, necessitating a lap for the other 200 feet, and the engineer made the fatal mistake of supposing that the men were at the 1000-foot instead of the 300, and when he started his machinery in mo-tion he stooped down to adjust a lubri-cator. He only took a few seconds, and as he raised up to his throttle the cage shot up out of the shaft and into the shieve before he could check it. Both men were thrown out to the floor

Both men were thrown out to the floor below, a distance of about flity feet, Mullen striking flat upon the fron plates, while Elmer was thrown into one of the empty cars standing there. The brakemen and carmen inshed to their assistance, while engineer Hassinger at once left the works, probably fearing bodily harm at the hands of the miners, whom he greatly incensed at the result of his carelessness. Mullen was found to be in an unconscious condition, while Elmer, although able to talk, was so badly bruised and shaken up that he can hardly recover.
