LOCAL BRIEFS.

Nurses to be Graduated—Five graduating nurses will receive their diplomas this evening at the Holy Cross hospital at the annual commencement.

Done Resigns—Willard Done has resigned the secretaryship of the Utah Association of Life Underwriters, and Joseph B. Smith of the New York Life has been chosen to succeed him.

Death of Virginia Minor—Virginia Sims Minor, only daughter of Capt. William Farnum Minor, and Viola Sims Minor, died at the Holy Cross hospital yesterday of tubercular peritonitis. She was 17 years of age and had been ill for several weeks. She was taken to the hospital about 10 days ago.

Death of Bishop Butler—The death of Bishop Alva Butler of Butteville ward, Salt Lake county, occurred yesterday, due to a complication of diseases. He is survived by a family of nine children. The funeral arrangements will be made as soon as word has been received from George W. one of the sons, who is living in Canada.

Templars are Inspected—The Salt Lake Knights Templar entertained last night in Masonic hall their brother knights from Ogden, Park City, Evanston, and Pocatello, the occasion being the annual inspection by J. K. Epperson of Ogden, grand deputy inspector of the Twenty-first inspection district. There was a fine banquet and the templar degree was conferred on P. D. Keeler of the Salt Lake commandery.

Stark First Applicant—James I. Stark, of 2206 Walnut avenue, Forest Dale, has made the first application for the land under the general enlarged homestead act of February 19, 1909. TUCKER IS RELEASED.

Seattle Officials Have No Knowledge Of Crime Confessed.

Al V. Tucker, alias P. C. Wallace, who gave himself up to the police Tuesday evening saying that he was wanted in Seattle for the theft in 1907 of a \$250 draft, was released from custody last night after Chief of Police Barlow received a telegram from Chief of Police Ward of Seattle, advising that no such man was wanted there, nor did the Washington city department have any knowledge of the crime confessed to have been committed.

Tucker told a story of how he had found a letter containing a draft of \$250, and had appropriated the money. He gave as his reason for confessing to the local police his crime the fact that his conscience had tortured him, and that he is now anxious to be returned to Seattle and serve his penalty.

REPUBLICAN CLUB IN EACH PRECINCT

Organization Effected Last Night
In Judge Ritchie's Court
Chamber.

AFTER NATIONAL CONVENTION

Governor Spry Says Activity in Present Movement Will Go Toward Bringing It Here.

Republican clubs were organized for each of the five municipal wards of Salt Lake and for Sandy, West Jordan and Granite districts at a meeting held for the purpose in Judge Ritchie's courtroom last night. Arthur L. Thomas was chosen chairman of the meeting, and W. H. Pollard secretary. A good attendance of Republicans from each of the districts named was present.

The main address of the evening was delivered by Jesse F. Turner, assistant national organizer. Mr. Turner stated that though the movement to organize affiliated Republican clubs was 15 years old, it was not until John Hays Hammond took hold of the movement last fall that definite results were achieved, and the movement became national. The speaker related how President Taft, when nominated to succeed President Roosevelt, took to his friend John Hays Hammond and asked him to take charge of the organization of the young men of the country into Republican clubs. Mr. Hammond undertook the work, and now Republican clubs are being organized from coast to coast.

Hiram E. Booth, United States district attorney, followed Mr. Turner with a brief speech. Mr. Booth said he had just recently returned from the east, where he had a conference with John Hays Hammond, and had discussed the work with him.

Governor Spry was given an ovation when he rose to address the gathering. The governor expressed his hearty commendation of the movement, stating that he had visited many sections of the state since the organization of the clubs by Mr. Hammond, and found them to be in good condition. He said that the Republican clubs are being organized from coast to coast.

The organization of the various districts was then effected, with the following officers:

Mr. Turner has arranged for these meetings and will be in Manti Friday night and at Mt. Pleasant the following evening, returning to Salt Lake for the meeting of the state executive committee Tuesday night.
